I hope everyone is having a memorable fall season. The students seemed to jump right into learning from the first day and staff have been busy doing their best to provide an engaging learning environment. The district listening sessions have been progressing with the latest session in City Point on September 18. The Board of Education invites you to submit your input via email or letter if you were unable to join any of the earlier sessions. The discussion questions are:



What does it mean to be a resident or business owner in the Pittsville School District? What is one thing you would never change about the schools/district and why? What do you think would improve our student learning environment and why? What would you like to see offered in the district in the next 5 years? 10 years? and why?

I recently received a contact from a former student athlete who is taking on his first ever role as a coach. This young man, now 35, worked hard in school to earn good grades, become a competitor, and made himself very coachable. He was an above average athlete, but not a great athlete who loved to compete and the challenges of overcoming loses. Athletes with this type of work ethic and attitude make coaching intrinsically rewarding because you know, even when their efforts fall short of the goal, they are giving you their best. He shared some thoughts on guiding principles to establish his coaching philosophy which I want to share with you.

- 1. All athletes, regardless of physical gifts, maturity, and skill level, are important to the team.
- 2. No one participates to be embarrassed by others, especially by the coach.
- 3. In the moment, focus on the moment and not the score.
- 4. Stay positive, regardless the outcome there is always a silver lining if you look for it. Always remember the athletes trust me to support them regardless of the outcome.
- 5. A team with healthy competitive attitudes is an amazing thing to be part of. I want to be the leader who provides this for my athletes.
- 6. This is about my student athletes.

If you take the information I shared about this new coach, and instead of referencing athletics reference students and learning, you have the vision of your entire staff in Pittsville.

Wireless Hotspots on Buses

Similar to the Kajeet SmartSpots for checkout program, the school district is also providing <u>Kajeet SmartBus</u> wireless hotspots on 5 Hahn Transportation buses. The SmartBus hotspots will be installed on several of the buses with longer routes, plus one or two of the buses used on trips. Students on long bus rides home, or on trips to athletic events or field trips, etc., will be able to connect with their school provided Chromebook to get school work done on the road, just like the Kajeet SmartSpot program for home use. Only school provided Chromebooks will be able to connect to the SmartBus hotspots. Money for this program was provided by a state grant.

Wireless Hotspots for Checkout by Students

Do you have poor Internet access at home, or perhaps none at all? The district is providing wireless hotspots called <u>Kajeet SmartSpots</u>, which are filtered Wi-Fi hotspots that allow students to easily connect on any of the nation's five leading cell phone networks. You do not need to have cell phone service from any of these national companies, but you must have some cell phone coverage in your area from at least one of these five leading cell providers: Verizon, AT&T, T-Mobile, Sprint, US Cellular. These devices are available for students to checkout overnight or over the weekend from the high school or elementary school libraries.

Kajeet SmartSpots will connect automatically to any of the cell provider's networks, whether at home or anywhere for that matter. Plus, the student's school provided Chromebook will also automatically connect to the hotspot - no configuration is necessary - all that they need to do is plug the SmartSpots in to any conventional household power source. However, ONLY a school provided Chromebook will connect to a Kajeet SmartSpot; a personal computer, laptop, tablet, cell phone, other non-school Chromebook, etc. will not be able to connect to these devices.

The district is providing these SmartSpots to help students get their homework and computer access done at home or elsewhere beyond the walls of our schools. Because these devices are content filtered and will not allow any video streaming from any of the online video streaming services like Hulu or Netflix, etc., students will be able to jump online to complete school assignments while staying on task and safe when accessing the Internet outside the classroom. Students will be expected to follow all rules and policies of online use of a school provided Internet device. Money for this program was provided by a state grant.

The aroma of baked goods and healthy, robust meals wafted through the hallways every afternoon. The Local Foods students were always gracious about sharing their delectable creations.

Crystal Apple teacher nominations were an affirmation once again of the wonderful work PHS staff does with students. Many of the PHS staff were nominated for the Crystal Apple teacher award. It is always a joy visiting our 4K students, as they are just getting to know me. I talk about my role as a principal with them. I love how excited they are when they see me in the halls!

Here is the school-wide project: Panther Pride is in Full Bloom! When students see this bulletin board, they can always find their very own flower and see its beauty, but more importantly, when they see the entire flower garden, they can see the difference we make all together!

Ms. Raygo and I also visited each grade level this fall to start a school kindness chain. We talked about kindness - what that means and students shared examples of kindness. We watched a video that showed a kindness chain in action. After our discussion and time together, students pledged to "Stick Together Against Bullying" and used Duct Tape to write their name on our banner for all to see!

In summary, I cherish my time being in classrooms and being with the children to continue to guide them to be kind and do the right thing!

Some changes to note: Our elementary school has transitioned from using Star Reading and Math (through Renaissance Learning) to Aimsweb as our universal screener. A universal screener is an assessment given to all students in the same way to determine where students are in their learning in the areas of math and reading. We have reduced the testing windows from 3 times to 2 times per year, to help reduce test fatigue. Our students were screened in September and will be assessed again in March 2019. Just like any assessment, this is one way (of many) to monitor student learning and growth!

Each student was given a set of clues and set out on the trails to discover what the clues were describing! This activity allowed them to use their sense of sight! The third station was a Taste and Smell station. At this station they experienced some different scents and flavors! They got to smell different things such as: vanilla, lemon, orange, and lavender! For the fourth and final station they got to do some Tree Identification. The students got to examine the leaves and identify what tree they belonged to. Once they were finished identifying them, they got to do some rubbings to take home!

I am so excited to be back for my second year here at Pittsville! This first quarter is off to a busy start! Our sixth graders are working on reading the book *Wonder* while learning about kindness, characters, and themes! Some of our 8th graders are working hard on making surveys that will be passed out to JH students on all different topics! Last, our 5th graders are learning to write about what they are reading and working in book clubs!

Physical Education is in Full Swing with Mr. Krueger

School is now in full swing and so are our Physical Education classes. It has been apparent that the students are enjoying their time to learn different ways to engage in physical activity. In grades K-3, we have been covering locomotor skills such as running, galloping, skipping and hopping, as well as object manipulation skills such as throwing, catching, underhand rolling, punting and kicking. In grades 4-6 we have done units in Soccer, Disc Golf and Rollerblading as well as many other fun activities. Ask your child what their favorite activity is so far. Ask them to teach you how to play it. Playing games as a whole family will help to promote healthy living.

I also want to remind your child to bring their tennis shoes to class so they can fully participate in class. Also, if your child has any health concerns that may restrict their ability to participate in Physical Education, please send a note expressing the severity and any restrictions.

I have thoroughly enjoyed having your students in class. Physical activity is important in everyday life so encourage your child to be physically active.

Sixth grade has been working extremely hard on their kindness unit! They are constantly showing their love of reading and are eager to learn. We have learned about characters in depth, and the sixth graders did a great job acting out scenes as they put themselves in the shoes of the character. We are slowly transitioning into themes and understanding that every story has a lesson! They will even get to complete a huge project that will be shown in the hallway so stop down our way!



Map Skills

The boys and girls in Miss Sischo's class have been learning about the seven large landmasses on the Earth called continents. They are North America, South America, Europe, Asia, Africa, Australia, and Antarctica. They also have been learning about the five large bodies of water on the Earth called oceans. They are the Pacific Ocean, Arctic Ocean, Indian Ocean, Atlantic Ocean, and the Southern Ocean. The students created a world map to show where the continents, oceans, equator, and prime meridian are located. The students also learned about directions and map skills. The students created a compass rose to show where each direction is located on a compass rose. Eighth grade Sociology is a new class this year, and we are off to a fun start! We have learned all about the history of Sociology, what Sociology is, and what Sociology research looks like. We decided we were going to study people by making our own surveys and comparing what we find to actual research already done. Be keeping a lookout for 8th grade students going around with their surveys!

Fifth grade students have been working hard learning to write about what they are reading. This is a very important skill when it comes to reading because it helps us look for small details and better understand what we are reading! They have also been working on book clubs where they get to learn together by reading and discussing on the same books that they chose.

LOW LUNCH BALANCES

Accounts below \$25.00 will be notified weekly through the Pittsville School District's SchoolMessenger alert system. The notice explains that your family food service funds are running low and money should be added as soon as possible.

If a family account gets below zero, a notice will be sent out stating if the amount due is not paid in three working days, your children will no longer be able to participate in the breakfast and/or lunch program. If no money is received, a note will go home explaining the account is closed and Pittsville Schools will no longer be providing breakfast, lunch, or milk. It is then the parent's responsibility to provide their child with a lunch from home. Once money is added, your children may again participate in the school's food service programs.

Here are a few tips to insure your family food service account is up-to-date and in good standing.

- Check with your answering machines and email to see if your family received an alert message concerning a low lunch balance.
- If you received a notice, please send payment as soon as possible.
- When sending in a payment, please include your family name and amount sent.

BREAKFAST PROGRAM

The **High School** will serve breakfast during PPT time and the students will take the food items to their next class.

The **Elementary School** will be serving breakfast at 8:00 am. Students that would like breakfast will first report to their classrooms, and then come down to the cafeteria for breakfast. Grades 4Kgn-3rd will be issued a breakfast card in the classroom to be turned in at the breakfast line. Grades 4th-8th will punch in their lunch numbers before going through the lines. School breakfast is an ideal solution on busy mornings when students are running late or parents have to be at work early. The cost is only \$1.00. Students that qualify for free or reduced lunch receive free breakfast.



Second Grade to the School Forest



Pittsville Juniors Attend Wisconsin Education Fair at MSTC & Tour UWSP: Pittsville juniors had the opportunity to visit with college reps from over 90 different colleges and universities across the Mid-West region at the annual Wisconsin Education Fair held at MSTC on October 1st. Juniors were able to obtain information for schools they may be interested in attending. From there, they traveled to UWSP and received a campus tour. This gave them first-hand experience of what a four year college campus is like. Students will be discussing their experience during their Junior Conference which will be held in November or December.

Teen Leadership Council Transitions to Young Adult Mentors. The 18-19 school year has brought change into the high school/junior high mentoring program. The focus this year has shifted from small group meetings to one on one mentoring meetings. Junior high students in grades 6-8 can sign up with Mrs. Friday or Mrs. Krystowiak to participate in this program. Students will be placed with a high school mentor in grades 10-12. The meetings are taking place from 11:40 to 12:00 two times a month during the first and third weeks. The goal of the program is for students in grades 6-8 to have a 'go to' relationship with an older teen to help with their current life, either academically or socially. In addition to this, knowing a student in the high school setting is a benefit when transitioning in a few short years. We are looking forward to seeing the relationships that will be made as a result of this program!

Time of Transition: Fall is a time of transition. As we look around, we can see it in nature and perhaps our own lives. We can see the colors changing on the leaves and in the necessary events in our homes, winterizing the lawn mower, harvesting the garden, and beginning to think about the holidays. Your student is also transitioning back into school. With almost the first quarter complete, students are transitioning back into new teachers, expectations, friendships, and life outside of school plans. During this time, be there for them to get back on track and into a good routine. Just as we adults make yearly preparations for our own lives, we too can help our teens get there too. When routines are in place, it helps students focus and feel more accomplished, just like when something gets crossed off the 'to do' list in our own lives. As the second quarter is beginning, help them pick up the pieces from quarter one and talk with them about how to make quarter two better. Perhaps that may be, making their own to do list, exploring options, meeting with teachers, or taking time to invest in new friendships. Patience can wear thin for students and parents as this happens. When 'new' comes into our lives, it takes time to adjust and re-focus.
