6th Grade Historical Fiction Zigzag Project

6th graders in Ms. Molitor's and Mr. Winters' classes participated in a mid-unit activity: a Historical Fiction Zigzag Project. Students chose a book to read as part of their book club and then students who read the same book worked together to create individual "zigzag posters" to show their understanding of historical fiction. Students included the title / author of their book; description of the main characters using descriptive words and a drawing; a summary of important parts / events in the book; problem and solution using words and symbols; timeline of the novel that events a minimum of ten events; positive and negative feelings included in the book; a book review as if the students were book publishers which included their opinion; setting that included a map drawn by the students; the learning about what happened in the time period in which the book was written which included comparing the information in the novel to events during the time period; and an event's cause / effect using words and symbols. A rubric was included to provide students with clear expectations of the project. Students shared their projects in small groups and they were displayed in their classroom.

4th / 5th Grade Science - Inherited Traits

Students learned about what traits they inherited from their parents and have learned about dominant and recessive genes. Students participated in a hands-on activity in class to learn about characteristics / traits of themselves and then went home to compare their characteristics / traits with parents.
