The fall season is now upon us, and school is in full swing. With the advent of the change in seasons, it is very important that everyone begin thinking about the possibility of school cancellations. As you are aware, in Wisconsin our weather can be very unpredictable, and parents should begin preparing for school cancellations, postponements, etc. Do you have a child care plan if school is cancelled? If school is dismissed early, does the office, your provider, the bus company, and your child know what your plan is? To make plans the day school is cancelled is not a good idea. As with over 630 students enrolled at Pittsville, it would be virtually impossible to deal with all

telephone calls coming in from parents. Today is a great time to review and communicate your desires by updating your emergency contact information, if you have not already done so. The District will again be utilizing our Instant Alert system to notify parents of any cancellations. Parents should update any changes of their phone contact information as soon as possible. Please contact the school if you have any questions regarding the Instant Alert system.

In Other News:

The Strategic Planning Committees continue to work on new Action Plans for the District. Through this process, the District will be building the educational foundation that it will be following for the next decade and beyond. The two plans will be completed this year and recommendations will be made to the School Board for adoption. The two action planning teams meeting are:

- 1) Strengthen Communication and Partnerships we will implement procedures and activities which promote family and community involvement in education.
- 2) Improve Student Achievement we will establish competencies, which require action steps and staff development required to compete in a global and technological society.

The District is very fortunate and grateful to have community members, staff, and students involved in creating these action plans. The commitment for continuous improvement is very important and evident in the Pittsville School District. Thank you to everyone involved!

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Budget Adoption and Tax Levy Certification

At a Special School Board meeting held on October 19, 2011, the Board approved the 2011-2012 School District of Pittsville Tax Levy at \$3,340,311.00 and adopted the 2011-2012 School District of Pittsville Budget totaling \$8,485,902.00, an -8.87% decrease from last year. This levy is equivalent to \$10.79 per \$1,000.00 of equalized valuation which compares to the \$11.17 rate in 2010-2011.

PITTSVILLE HIGH SCHOOL NEWS



I want to begin this article by addressing our success with Advance Placement (AP) testing. Taking AP tests allow students to receive college credit for high school courses, provided they receive a qualifying score on the respective AP test for that content area. Most colleges will award credit for a score of three or higher; the actual score accepted for credit is established by the college. The College Board, the company that publishes the AP tests, recommends credit for a score of three or higher. When statistics are published about students who pass AP tests, three is the score the College Board uses. AP tests scores range from one to five.

Last year, Pittsville High School students achieved the best results ever on AP tests. Four out of the five students who took the English Language test received a three or higher. In English Literature, four out of six students received a three or higher. The students taking these AP tests were enrolled in the AP Literature Course taught by Ms. Sarah Freedlund. The course is generally taken by juniors and seniors.

Another course usually taken by juniors is Advanced US History. This course is taught by Mr. Bob Piotrowski. Of the seven students who took the test, three received a passing score. An additional six other tests were taken by students who completed online class work, and all received a score of three or higher.

Another set of data from last year showed that 78% of our AP students received a three or better. That was 8% higher than the state average of 70%. The national average is only 60%. Our students were 32% more successful than in any previous year. I attribute part of this success to the changes staff made in preparing students for the AP tests. I also want to congratulate our students who took a serious approach to the AP testing.

One of our seniors last year passed four AP tests. This student also passed three AP tests as a junior. The student received 24 credits as a result of participation in advanced classes while in high school. This is equivalent to two full time semesters of college credits. An AP test costs roughly \$90.00. For approximately \$720.00, this student has completed a year of college course work while in high school. The college tuition at Stevens Point for a year is currently \$7000.00. This student has the possibility, provided the student does not change majors, to complete a four-year program in three years. This student's experience is a great example as to why we offer AP curriculum both in our school curriculum and in the form of online classes. AP classes can save our graduates time and money.

I want to share some other data about what our high school students do after high school. Last year, 59% of our graduates participated in the ACT tests. Statistically, 30% of high school students complete a four-year college program. Within three years after graduation, 53% of our graduates are enrolled in a technical college, usually Mid-State Technical College. I point these statistics out to help parents assist their son or daughter in making educational choices. Approximately 15% to 20% of graduates who chose a four-year school, without fully investigating technical colleges, may be losing time and money by changing to a technical college after starting one or two years of a four-year program. The tuition at UW-Marshfield/Wood County is \$5000.00 a year. A year of tuition at Mid-State is \$2700 depending upon the program. A technical college can be a less expensive option for a student who is looking to see whether or not college is for them. Technical college credit, in many cases, can be transferred into four-year programs for students who decide to enter a four-year program later. I hope these thoughts assist parents in guiding their child's decision about educational options after high school.

The PHS greenhouse is up and running. Mr. Urban with the help of his seventh and eighth graders is currently growing poinsettias, romaine lettuce and germinating tomato seeds. Mr. Urban just recently met with Don Josko for two hours after school to get better understanding of how the cooling and heating system works, as well as technical advice on the new hydroponic systems and their nutrient requirements. He answered questions concerning the greenhouse and the upcoming goals and usage. All the FFA Alumni expressed how impressed the new facility was and how happy they were that the School District made such a commitment to our students and the agriculture department.

SPLASH OF RED CRANBERRY HIGHWAY TOUR "Celebrates 10th Anniversary"

It is amazing that ten years ago this month, the Pittsville FFA/FFA Alumni started conducting cranberry tours at Tom, Janeen and Wayne Gardner cranberry marshes. The tours started as a discussion on how to increase enrollment in the Cranberry Science Class. FFA Alumni member Marv Kohlbeck and FFA/Ag instructor Bill Urban approached Mr. Gardner ten summers ago asking for permission to give cranberry tours on his marsh and processing plant. The three things Mr. Urban remembers from that day was Mr. Gardner's willingness to help out the FFA and ag program anyway he could, the support we immediately received with our idea, and when asked how much money he would want for each tourist, Mr. Gardner replied "as long as the money goes toward helping the FFA members, he did not want a dime."

Ten years ago, the tour began with five dates and totaled 60 people. Last year, we had seven dates and educated over 600 guests about the cranberry industry in "Cranberry Basket of the World", including many fourth grade groups, lifelong learners, and high school groups. We have had guest from every state in the nation, as well from the countries of Australia, Germany, Japan, Canada and other parts of Europe. We have also hosted the Governor of Wisconsin, State Representatives, agriculture groups, FFA groups, Senior Citizen groups, school superintendent groups and many more vocations.

These student led groups have been recognized locally at the state and national level for their educational value to our students and uniqueness to our community. The comments heard by these student led tours include: What a great learning tool for young adults! It's nice to see young people in different situations that they will use later in life!

The satisfaction Mr. Urban receives as a teacher is the growth of the individual. As Mr Urban stated, "seeing actual growth of the students starting very nervous and unsure of themselves on the first tour, to leading a tour, speaking confidently to a group of adults by the end of the tour is very satisfying.

If you are a resident of the Pittsville School District you are welcome to come free as our guests. This two hour cranberry tour takes place just east of Pittsville in the heart of central Wisconsin Cranberry Country. Pittsville FFA Members and students of the only Cranberry Science Class taught in the nation will give this all-inclusive tour.

The tour will meet at the Pittsville Conference Room located on Elementary Avenue at 9:30 a.m. The tour includes the following: touring a current marsh under construction, new beds not yet in production, producing beds with the tourists given the opportunity to pick fresh fruit from the vine, as well as observing harvest, testing, cleaning and freezing of the berries.

Mr. Urban has said " it takes a village to educate and have a successful tour." The help of the Gardners, Pam Kumm taking reservations, the Minors supervising our cooks, Dan Hahn being flexible with his buses, FFA Alumni members Marv Kohlbeck and Matt Lippert filling in for Mr Urban when he is at the National FFA Convention and the support of the School Board and Administration makes the tour so successful. Without these peoples' willingness to go the extra mile, the tours would have died on the vine many years ago.

Dear Parents and Students.

We have made it through the first couple months of school! Congratulations. Beginnings sometimes can be bumpy, but over all we have all done a good job of working together to make the ride smooth.

Most of you have spent some time completing the MAP testing during the month of October. MAP stands for measures of academic progress. The purpose of this test is to determine where your strengths and needs are in the areas of math, reading and language arts. We will again be testing in January to see how much progress you have made in your learning. What will we do with the results? As teachers, we will meet to talk about those areas that there is greatest need for remediation in. We will also talk about those areas where students excel. The MAP test is an excellent tool for teachers to help meet each student's learning needs.

During the month of November, we will be administering the WKCE tests as required currently by the state for all students in Grades 3-8 and Grade 10. This test gives us and the state, a view of how we are doing as a school. We also use this data to analyze our curriculum. After looking at the results we ask ourselves, "Is our curriculum in line with the expectations of the State of Wisconsin" and if so "How are we doing in teaching so that students learn that curriculum?"

Though it seems like our days are filled with testing, we really have a lot of other wonderful learning opportunities happening in our school. We are fortunate enough to have adopted a new math series this year. Students in Grades K-5 are learning math using a new series entitled Envision Math. Students in Grades G-8 are learning from the series Big Ideas. These series concentrates not only the basics of learning facts and operations, etc. but take students to a whole new world of application and problem solving. We know that excellent math skills and abilities is important in nearly every career. So, we are working together as a school to amp up our math program so that students can become leaders in their 21st century world.

CHILDREN HAVING MEDICATION AT SCHOOL

It is absolutely necessary that parents bring their child's medication to the school office and fill out the permission forms. Our legal requirements for providing medication at school are: 1) the child's medication must be in a properly labels prescription bottle. 2) a signed permission form with direction from the prescribing physician. 3) a signed permission form from the parent or legal guardian.

If a child is to receive over-the-counter medication, they must be provided by the parent in the original container with dosages on the package. No OTC medications will be given without a signed consent form.

LOW LUNCH BALANCES

Accounts below \$25.00 will be notified weekly using email and the Pittsville School District Instant Alert System. The notice explains that your family food service funds are running low and money should be added as soon as possible.

If a family account gets below zero, a notice will be sent out stating if the amount due is not paid in three working days, your children will no longer be able to participate in the breakfast and/or lunch program. If no money is received, a note will go home explaining the account is closed and Pittsville Schools will no longer be providing breakfast, lunch, or milk. It is then the parent's responsibility to provide their child with a lunch from home. Once money is added, your children may again participate in the school's food service programs.

Here are a few tips to insure your family food service account is up-to-date and in good standing.

- Check with your answering machines and email to see if your family received an instant alert message concerning a low lunch balance.
- If you received a notice, please send payment as soon as possible.
- When sending in a payment, please include your family name and amount sent.

Within minutes of an emergency, school officials can use Instant Alert to deliver a single, clear message to the students' parents or guardians by telephone, cell phone, e-mail, pager or PDA in any combination. Instant Alert can also be used to notify you of a school closing due to inclement weather. It's an equally effective way to keep you informed of everyday activities, such as event times and locations as well as schedule changes. Keeping parents informed and involved helps to assure student safety and improve student success.

Instant Alert is Internet based, allowing each family to maintain a secure, password protected online profile. You can log into your profile at any time to update your contact information. Maintaining the accuracy of your profile will increase the ability of the school to keep you informed.

Your online profile will enable you to:

- Input your personal contact information.
- Select which type of school information you would like to receive on each of your contact devices
- Add contact information of other caretakers of your children, such as a grandparent or neighbor.



Ecology Class

The Pittsville School Forest was visited by Mr. Steward's Ecology class on October 4th to conduct water quality testing in the pond located on the southeast corner of the forest. The students in Ecology class are Marissa Becker, Kaitlin Hahn, Ed Kleinhenz, Nick Krohn, Autumn Lutz, Dallas Oates, Casey Oleson, Julia Peaslee, Jessie Robus, Dylan Rudie, Joe Schooley, Olie Voight, and Jake Wipfli.

Chemical test conducted on the water at the pond included dissolved oxygen content, carbon dioxide, pH, nitrates, and sulfates. Also, an aquatic macroinvertebrate species water quality index was completed. Macroinvertebrates, aquatic insects, are an excellent indicator of the water quality of a river, lake, stream, or pond.

The image is of Olie Voight, Nick Krohn, Jake Wipfli, and Joe Schooley using a seine net to collect specimens, while the rest of the students assisted in the identification of each species collected. Some of the aquatic insects caught were Stonefly, Mayflies, and Caddis Fly larvae, along with Giant Water Bugs, Water Scorpions, and Predacious Diving Beetles, to name a few. The pond at the Pittsville School Forest scored on the edge between excellent and good for water quality.

The visit to the school forest provided students with a firsthand experience of sample collecting of aquatic species, testing and experimentation using chemical detecting kits in a real world setting, along with the opportunity to complete and evaluate the outcomes of each test. Overall the experience was a great learning opportunity for everyone.

SOIL CONSERVATION TEAM

The 2011 PHS Soil Conservation Team competed in the Wisconsin Rapids area. Team "Dirt" slogged through a wet day in the soils pits, while competing against Marshfield, Wisconsin Rapids, and Auburndale. Pittsville came in as the defending Wood County Soils Team. Prior to the competition, the team took an educational trip to Central Sands Dairy. The dairy is the largest in central Wisconsin. milking 3800 cows and averaging 70 pounds of milk per cow. The tour was hosted by owner Gordie Jones. In the afternoon the PHS Soils Team competed for the Wood Marshfield, the traditional County Championship, powerhouse in the soil judging contest. Marshfield was unstoppable, providing the top five members of the contest, but Pittsville remained Marshfield's largest threat. Between the two schools, they claimed the top dozen spots in the 70 contestant event.

The top Pittsville Team was composed of 6th, 8th, 9th and 11th place finishers Taylor Pralle, Hannah Marti, Trail Pierce and Eric Hahn. Pralle's score of 82 in pit 2 was the best in the contest for that pit.




