From the Desk of District Administrator Terry Reynolds . . .

The fall season is now upon us, and school is in full swing. With the advent of the change in seasons, it is very important that everyone begin thinking about the possibility of school cancellations. As you are aware, in Wisconsin, our weather can be very unpredictable, and parents should begin preparing for school cancellations/postponements, etc. Do you have a child care plan if school is cancelled? If school is dismissed early, does the office, your provider, the bus company, and your child know what your plan is? To make plans the day school is cancelled is not a good idea, as with over 620 students enrolled at Pittsville, it would be virtually impossible to deal with all telephone calls coming in from parents. Today is a great time to review and communicate your desires by updating your emergency contact information, if you have not already done so.

The District will be utilizing the new School Messenger (Skylert) system to notify parents of any cancellations. Parents should update any changes of their phone contact information as soon as possible in the Skyward Family Access Accounts. Please contact the School if you have any questions regarding the School Messenger system.

In Other News:

The 2012-13 school year will bring many exciting changes to your child's learning in the Pittsville School District. This year will also bring changes to the way schools themselves are evaluated by the state.

Sometime in October, the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction (DPI) will issue a **School Report Card** for our school and for every public school in Wisconsin. The School Report Card, using multiple measures of student learning, will provide valuable guidance on how our school is doing and where it can improve. The new report cards will help all Wisconsin public schools get a better picture of how well they help children learn, advance to the next grade, and graduate ready for college and career.

The School Report Cards are just one part of a new statewide accountability system for schools. To develop the system, DPI worked closely with parents, educators, and members of the business community. The Governor, State Superintendent, legislative leaders, and the U.S. Department of Education also helped shape the new accountability system. This system, and the report cards, will grow and develop in future years.

Here's how the School Report Card will work. Each public school will earn a "score," called an accountability index score, from 0 to 100. These scores will be included on the report card. The accountability index score that our school receives will be based on our performance in four priority areas:

- 1. **Student achievement** in reading and mathematics on state assessments.
- 2. **Student growth**, measured by year-to-year improvements in reading and math achievement.
- 3. **Closing gaps** in performance between specific student groups (comparing English language learners, low-income students, students with disabilities, and members of racial or ethnic group with their peers).
- 4. **On-track to graduation/postsecondary readiness**, using reliable predictors of high school graduation and postsecondary success.

Based on our school's score, we will be placed into one of five categories, from Significantly Exceeds Expectations to Fails to Meet Expectations.

It's important to note that the 0 to 100 accountability index score is not a "percent correct" measurement, similar to a score your child might earn on a test in school. Instead, in combination with other school data, the accountability index score will help our school staff determine what areas we do well in and where we need improvement. The goal is to help every student in our school succeed, graduate, and be ready to pursue further education and a career.

The new statewide accountability system will also include methods to spread effective practices of high-performing schools and support to help struggling schools improve. School Report Cards will come out every year and student results on state tests will continue to be reported. Eventually, this system may include private schools receiving publicly funded vouchers as well.

The Department of Public Instruction will produce two versions of each school report card, the basic School Report Card and a lengthier Technical Report Card with very detailed information. For more information, please visit the DPI website at dpi.wi.gov/oea/acct/accountability.html.

I am confident the new School Report Card, as well as the many other changes being implemented in Wisconsin schools, will help our school identify our strengths and promptly move to address our challenges. Please let me know your thoughts and questions on the School Report Card as they arise.

SchoolMessenger Parent Notification System

The Pittsville School District will no longer be using Instant Alert for our instant messaging service. We instead will be using our Skyward system's SchoolMessenger. This service will allow you to update all your information in just one account. For this system to work, all you need to do is make sure all contact information in Skyward's Family and Student Access is updated. The district is also excited to announce that with this new service we will be able to deliver important information to you via SMS text messaging. This service is not intended to replace our existing means of communicationrather it will enhance them. The provided service is bv SchoolMessenger. Information can be found at www.SchoolMessenger. com or on the Pittsville School District Web Site. The district will only use the service to provide information that is timely and relevant.

In order to participate in the new feature of this service you must indicate your willingness to receive text messages to your phone. The process is simple and only takes a few seconds to complete. Simply text any one of the following words to the number 68453: subscribe, optin, ves. You'll know vou were successful if you receive the following reply message: "You are registered to receive aprox 3 msgs/mo. Txt STOP to quit, HELP for help." You'll want to repeat the opt-in process for any wireless numbers that you wish to include. In addition to performing the opt-in process above you'll want to insure that the district has your wireless number(s) in our student information database. If you haven't provided alreadv vour cell information to your school please remember to do so in your Skyward Family Access account.

Please note, although the district does not charge you for this service, it does not pay for text message charges that may be incurred by you for sending or receiving text messages. Check with your wireless carrier for possible charges. If you have any questions please feel free to contact your child's school.





It is amazing to think we are one-fourth of the way through the school year, and even though there are many changes here at the high school, things are flowing pretty smoothly.

Let me begin by defining a few terms (no pun intended) that have to do with the schedule. Since we are in the block, we run on a "term" basis. A term is a quarter of a year, and is the equivalent to a semester in the past, since block classes are twice as long as they were under the old schedule. That means that a semester class is equivalent to a year-long class from the past. A term class is worth .5 credits, and a semester class is worth one full credit.

We now have Panther Pride Time (PPT) between blocks one and two. This is a 44 minute period when, Tuesday through Friday, students go to one of their four classes for make-up work, enhancement activities, or study time. It is a great opportunity to get caught up or get ahead.

Every other Monday during PPT time is Advising, where students from each grade are assigned to a teacher who is their advisor for their four years at PHS. Students have a connection to the school with a person who will learn their interests and aspirations, and help them with high school and post high school planning. Themes such as the bullying prevention and test-taking skill activities were initiated during first term. Multicultural awareness and citizenship are other Advising activities we may pursue this year, along with the emphasis on academic success that is a constant during Advising.

The other Mondays during PPT will be spent participating in clubs that the staff has developed and the students choose, such as a Rock n' Roll Club and Cribbage Club, or participating in recognition assemblies.

We also have developed Solutions Teams, which are committees of teachers who, based on staff recommendations, work with students who are at-risk of failing. The Solution Team develops a plan to get them back on track.

So: There are many changes that come along with the block schedule. I appreciate how smoothly the staff and students have adapted to these changes. There is a very positive atmosphere at PHS, and I am developing a keen understanding of Panther Pride. It is more than athletics; it extends to students taking care of each other, the cleanliness of the building, and the smiles that I see in the hallways. I believe this positive school climate is due to our great student body and a very caring staff. I also believe that it will continue to increase, and show up in test scores and the choices that these you adults make now, and into the distant future.

PHS Raises Outdoor Shelter

For the past six months, the Pittsville High School Building & Construction class has been busy preparing for the raising of the outdoor shelter at the school forest on Highway 80. Last year, the School Forest Committee decided to move forward with a timber frame design for the outdoor structure. The majority of the lumber was logged directly from the school forest and locally cut into the large timbers. In May, the concrete slab was poured for the foundation. Timber frame joinery (mortise and tenon) was milled at the school by B&C students.

On Sunday, October 14th, several staff and community members fought through the cold and rain to raise the timber frame building. The frame consists of five bents (post and beam connections) and is 30 feet wide by 60 feet long. Next spring, the B&C class will finish the building by installing the rafters and roofing. The building will be used by K-12 staff and students to teach and learn about outdoor and environmental education.

Just like the changing leaves, October has been a flurry of activity at the Elementary School. We celebrated our second monthly Civics Assembly dedicated to Columbus Day, the spirit of exploration, and Golden Awards.

Several eighth graders from Mrs. Fischer's Principal Advisory Committee led the festivities. Our first Panther Diner will be held Oct. 17, and will be enjoyed by the students in Ms. Schooley's Fifth grade class.

Kindergarteners will be involved for the first time in a statewide literacy assessment known as PALs during the week of Oct. 15. Our three kindergarten teachers spent time involved in training for this small group assessment, and are looking forward to finding out more about the students' understanding of letters and sounds and how they work together to create words. Parents will be hearing more about this at Parent Conferences Oct. 23 and 25.

First through eighth graders have all been involved in Measures of Academic Progress (MAPs) throughout October. These computer based assessments will be discussed during Parent Conferences, and are another way teachers use information to guide their instruction with students and meet students' needs with small group work. Fifth through eighth grade will be involved in the state-wide WKCE testing Oct. 22-25. Third and fourth grade will be involved in WKCE testing the week of Nov. 5th. The grades did testing a little differently this year, due to the revised high school schedule for WKCEs and the shared staff at both buildings.

Behind the scenes, teachers have been busy with team meetings. Once a month, teams meet to work on revising our curriculum (what we want students to know and be able to do, aligned with WI State Standards and Common Core Standards). Other teams work on Communication/Community Partnership, and School Climate, respectively. A team of teachers along with Mrs. Fischer were recently involved in a Response to Intervention conference. We are looking forward to continuing our commitment to providing excellent instruction for all students, and making our school a warm and engaging place for all students.

We will be finishing up our Little Caesar's Pizza fund raiser on Oct. 25. We are also looking forward to our PTO Book Fair in October. Both of these opportunities allow for our school to look at various ways that we can benefit students and look at ways of improving our services to students. FOOD SERVICE NEWS THE NEW LUNCH GUIDELINES

The USDA has implemented the following new regulations for the National School Lunch Program starting the 2012-13 school year.

- All students MUST take 1/2 cup of vegetable or fruit with each lunch.
- Increase the amount of fruit and vegetables as well as offering the required servings for dark green and red/orange vegetables per week.
- 1/2 cup of legumes must be offered once a week.
- At least ½ the grains offered must be whole grain-rich. For the 2013–14 school year, all of the grains will be required to be whole grain-rich.
- Requirements include calorie, saturated fat, and sodium restrictions and the elimination of all Trans-fat.
- Calorie restrictions by grade are; K-5 (550-600), 6-8 (600-700), 9-12 (750-850).

The USDA has given schools specific guidelines as far as portion sizes and the number of grains, fruits, and vegetables that should be served daily to meet these standards. In looking over our menu at Pittsville Schools, we have already dropped food items containing Trans-fat. To meet the other requirements, we will need to cut down our portion sizes on grain items (pasta, bread, rice, buns, crackers, breadsticks) and increase the servings of fruit and vegetables. We also have some entrée items high in sodium and will be looking for alternatives throughout the year.

ONLINE PAYMENTS

Parents can make online payments from home or work by using their VISA or MasterCard credit or debit card. Payments are made through the student's Skyward Family Access account. To make online payments:

LOW LUNCH BALANCES

Accounts below \$25.00 will be notified weekly through the Pittsville School District's SchoolMessenger alert system. The notice explains that your family food service funds are running low and money should be added as soon as possible.

If a family account gets below zero, a notice will be sent out stating if the amount due is not paid in three working days, your children will no longer be able to participate in the breakfast and/or lunch program. If no money is received, a note will go home explaining the account is closed and Pittsville Schools will no longer be providing breakfast, lunch, or milk. It is then the parent's responsibility to provide their child with a lunch from home. Once money is added, your children may again participate in the school's food service programs.

Here are a few tips to insure your family food service account is up-to-date and in good standing.

- Check with your answering machines and email to see if your family received an alert message concerning a low lunch balance.
- If you received a notice, please send payment as soon as possible.
- When sending in a payment, please include your family name and amount sent.

Greetings from the Pittsville Athletic Department,

The fall athletic season has come and gone, and we are now busy preparing for the winter athletic season. Before we move on to the Wrestling, Basketball and Pom Pon seasons, I'd like to congratulate our fall athletes, coaches and fans on a great season. The Panther teams represented our community extremely well, and their hard work and determination is very much appreciated. As we head into the winter season, I would like to remind parents and athletes that every athlete will again need to fill out the concussion form stating that they have received and understand the information provided to them about concussions. According to the new state law, if an athlete participated in a fall sport, they will still need to fill out the form before they are allowed to participate in the winter season. Concussion forms will be provided through the coaches, or they can be picked up in the school offices.

Finally, with winter weather quickly approaching, it is very likely that there will be weather related athletic postponements or cancellations. There are two ways that I will be communicating those changes with parents and the public. The quickest and easiest way for fans to find out when there are athletic changes is to sign up with the Notify Me! option on the district calendar (www.pittsville.k12.wi.us). The district calendar is in the top middle of the webpage, and if you click on a date, you can see what is going on in the district on that day. If you look in the upper right hand corner by the monthly calendar, there is a link labeled Notify Me! By following this link and filling in the information, you can be notified as soon as there is a change to any of the events that you sign up for. The second method we will use for informing parents and students of athletic postponements or cancellations is through the use of the Skylert School Messenger system which will make the automated calls to those involved in the events that are affected. It is important that the Skyward system has current contact information for each family in order for these alerts to reach everyone. If you need help in updating or checking your contact information, please contact your child's office for assistance.

It is amazing that 11 years ago, the Pittsville FFA/FFA Alumni started conducting cranberry tours at Tom, Janeen and Wayne Gardner cranberry marshes. The tours started as a discussion on how to increase enrollment in the Cranberry Science Class. When FFA Alumni member Marv Kohlbeck and FFA/ag instructor Bill Urban approached Mr. Gardner eleven summers ago asking for permission to give cranberry tours on his marsh and processing plant. The three things Mr. Urban remembers from that day was Mr. Gardner's willingness to help out the FFA and Ag program anyway he could, the support we immediately received with our idea and when asked how much money he would want for each tourist. Mr. Gardner replied "as long as the money goes toward helping the FFA members, he did not want a dime."

Eleven years ago, tour began with five dates and we totaled 60 people. This year we had nine dates and educated over 800 guests about the cranberry industry in "Cranberry Basket of the World," including many fourth grade groups, life long learners, and high school groups. Over the years, we have had guests from every state in the nation, as well from the countries of Australia, Germany, Japan, Canada and other parts of Europe. We have also hosted the Governor of Wisconsin, State Representatives, agriculture groups, FFA groups, Senior Citizen groups, school superintendent groups, and many more vocations.

These student led groups have been recognized locally, at the state and national level for their educational value to our students and uniqueness to our community. The comments heard by these student led tours include: What a great learning tool for young adults! It's nice to see young people in different situations that they will use later in life! They are so well behaved and professional looking! What a beautiful auditorium and facilities you have here at Pittsville

The satisfaction Mr. Urban receives as a teacher is the growth of the individual. As Mr. Urban stated, "seeing actual growth of the students starting very nervous and unsure of themselves on the first tour, to leading a tour, speaking confidently to a group of adults by the end of the tour is very satisfying.

Finally, Mr Urban has said "it takes a village to educate and have a successful tour." Without the help of the Gardners, other cranberry growers such as the Potters, Mark & Sue Redmond, Heurer Brothers, Pam Kumm taking reservations, the Minors supervising our cooks, Dan Hahn being flexible with his buses, FFA Alumni members Marv Kohlbeck and Matt Lippert filling in for Mr. Urban when he is at the National FFA Convention and the School Board and Administration supporting the tour to help make it so successful. Without these people willingness to go the extra mile, the tours would have died on the vine many years ago.

RULES AND POINTERS FOR PEDESTRIANS AND DRIVERS

Pay attention to reduce your chances of being in an accident. The most important safety tip to reduce pedestrian injuries and fatalities is to pay attention. You can significantly reduce your chances of being in a collision with a motor vehicle by obeying traffic rules and being aware of dangers posed by cars in your vicinity. Make eye contact with drivers if possible and make sure that they can see you. Both drivers and pedestrians have certain safety responsibilities that depend on both circumstances and common sense.

Drivers must:

- Yield to pedestrians when crossing a sidewalk or entering an alley or driveway
- Yield to pedestrians who have started crossing at an intersection or crosswalk on a "walk" signal or a green light, if there is no walk signal
- Yield to pedestrians who are crossing the highway within a marked or unmarked crosswalk at an intersection where there are no traffic lights or control signals
- Not overtake and pass any vehicle that stops at an intersection or crosswalk to permit a pedestrian or bicyclist to cross the roadway safely

Pedestrians must:

- Yield to drivers when crossing a road where there is no intersection or crosswalk or where the pedestrian does not have a green or "walk" signal and where vehicles have a green signal
- Not suddenly move into the path of a closely approaching vehicle that does not have sufficient time to yield for a pedestrian
- Walk on and along the left side of a highway when not walking on a sidewalk. Note: This law does not apply to bicycles. Bicycles operate under the same laws as other legal vehicles on the road and should always stay on the right side of the road.
