We were all are very deeply troubled by the events which took place in December at Sandy Hook Elementary School in Newtown, Connecticut. Anything which shatters the peace and innocence of our children, no matter how many miles away it happens, affects us and our mission to help your children grow and develop into adults we can all be proud of.

The events in Newtown are stark reminders of the importance of our safety procedures and emergency preparedness training. I want to take this opportunity to remind all our families that we conduct regular drills, including those for a building lockdown, and that we are also in the process of looking at further increased security equipment at all our school buildings. Your cooperation with any future security precautions/changes is greatly appreciated.

We have ongoing discussions and trainings with the Pittsville Police Department to maintain updated procedures, and we have again re-examined all our security procedures to make sure that we are doing all that we can to keep our schools safe for everyone.

As parents, we are troubled by events like what occurred in Connecticut. However, times like this also provide us with the opportunity to be leaders as we help our children to understand, also reminding them that, as the adults in their lives, we do everything we can to keep them safe.

As our thoughts and prayers continue to go out to those in Newtown and their extended families throughout the country, please remember that we are here for you and your children. The safety of our students and staff is our highest priority, and we invite you to contact your principal or myself with any comments, questions, or concerns.

21st Century Learning

Schools teach reading, writing, math, science, social studies, physical education, and a variety of fine arts and vocational skills.

But, have you heard of 21st Century Skills? The phrase "21st Century Skills" is used to refer to a set of skills that today's employers tell schools we should be developing in young people. What are these skills and what do they have to do with students in our schools?

To help this idea of 21st Century Skills come to life, take a moment to think of a recent positive experience you have had with an employee at a store, bank, restaurant, garage, or school when you needed help or were having a problem. What qualities did you appreciate about the employee who served you?

Was the employee:

•Interested in you as a person?

- •Focused on meeting your needs quickly and efficiently?
- •Concerned about doing a high quality job?

Did the person:

- Persevere no matter what obstacles might occur?
- •Use technology as a practical workplace tool?
- •Ask for the help of other employees or supervisors if needed?
- Consider unusual solutions to your problem?

If you answered yes to most or all of the questions about the employee's qualities, the person likely has well developed 21st Century Skills. 21st Century Skills fall into three main categories. (*Trilling & Fadel*, 2009):

1. Learning and innovation skills – This area includes critical thinking and problem-solving, often done in a group setting where members of the team work well together and have strong communication skills. Members of teams encourage one another to be creative and innovative in their solutions to problems.

2. Digital literacy skills – Digital literacy includes being able to use various forms of technology as a tool to research, organize, evaluate, and communicate information.

3. Career and life skills – The qualities that are emphasized in this area include helping youth to be flexible and adaptable thinkers, show personal initiative, interact well with people of all ages and cultural backgrounds, take personal responsibility in doing quality work, and provide leadership in their area of expertise.

In today's classrooms, you will often see students doing their learning both individually and in small groups. Technology tools like netbooks, digital cameras, and iPads are used with teacher guidance to look for information and share ideas. Teachers design lessons that engage students in solving real world issues. Does this mean that the 3 R's are lost? Not at all! Reading, writing, and arithmetic are more important than ever to ensure that we have educated workers and citizens for the future. The 21st Century Skills provide students with ways to learn about their world that are meaningful, exciting, and build deeper understanding. It is our goal here in the Pittsville School District to make sure all students leave Pittsville with the skills they need to fulfill all their personal life aspirations.

Seniors:

Please continue to work on **scholarships** and stay tuned for the local scholarships which will be posted by the end of January. Most local scholarships are due Friday, April 12th, but some are due <u>sooner</u>. For more information, check out the Scholarship Tab under High School Counseling on the PHS Home page. Also, please remember to complete your **FAFSA** before the priority date for your college; your 2012 taxes should be completed before you apply for the most accurate information. Applications are available online at: <u>http://www.fafsa.ed.gov/</u> (*There is also a link off the HS Counseling website.*)

Juniors:

If you are planning to **register for the ACT** this spring, please make sure you register online before the registration date ends to avoid paying a late fee. Students can register online at <u>www.actstudent.org</u> (*There is also a link off the HS Counseling website under the "Testing" tab.*) Spring test dates include:

- a. Test Date: February 9, 2013—Registration Deadline PAST: January 11, 2013
- b. Test Date: April 13, 2013—Registration Deadline: March 8, 2013
- c. Test Date: June 8, 2013—Registration Deadline: May 3, 2013

Students who plan to attend Mid State Technical College after graduating should consider taking the **Accuplacer** this spring as well. The Accuplacer can be taken at PHS and does not require an official registration. Students should see the school counselor to sign up. Finally, if you were unable to schedule a **junior meeting** prior to winter break, please contact Mrs. Backaus to schedule one soon. Important topics will be discussed including the possibility of **job shadowing**

Sophomores and Freshmen:

LOW LUNCH BALANCES FOOD SERVICE NEWS

Accounts below \$25.00 will be notified weekly through the Pittsville School District's SchoolMessenger alert system. The notice explains that your family food service funds are running low and money should be added as soon as possible.

If a family account gets below zero, a notice will be sent out stating if the amount due is not paid in three working days, your children will no longer be able to participate in the breakfast and/or lunch program. If no money is received, a note will go home explaining the account is closed and Pittsville Schools will no longer be providing breakfast, lunch, or milk. It is then the parent's responsibility to provide their child with a lunch from home. Once money is added, your children may again participate in the school's food service programs.

Here are a few tips to insure your family food service account is up-to-date and in good standing.

- Check with your answering machines and email to see if your family received an alert message concerning a low lunch balance.
- If you received a notice, please send payment as soon as possible.
- When sending in a payment, please include your family name and amount sent.

SchoolMessenger Parent Notification System

The Pittsville School District will no longer be using Instant Alert for our instant messaging service. We instead will be using our Skyward system's SchoolMessenger. This service will allow you to update all your information in just one account. For this system to work, all you need to do is make sure all contact information in Skyward's Family and Student Access is updated. The district is also excited to announce that with this new service we will be able to deliver important information to you via SMS text messaging. This service is not intended to replace our existing means of communication- rather it will enhance them. The service is provided by SchoolMessenger. Information can be found at www.SchoolMessenger.com or on the Pittsville School District Web Site. The district will only use the service to provide information that is timely and relevant.

In order to participate in the new feature of this service you must indicate your willingness to receive text messages to your phone. The process is simple and only takes a few seconds to complete. Simply text any one of the following words to the number 68453: subscribe, optin, yes. You'll know you were successful if you receive the following reply message: "You are registered to receive aprox 3 msgs/mo. Txt STOP to guit, HELP for help." You'll want to repeat the opt-in process for any wireless numbers that you wish to include. In addition to performing the opt-in process above you'll want to insure that the district has your wireless number(s) in our student information database. If you haven't already provided your cell information to your school please remember to do so in your Skyward Family Access account.

Please note, although the district does not charge you for this service, it does not pay for text message charges that may be incurred by you for sending or receiving text messages. Check with your wireless carrier for possible charges. If you have any questions please feel free to contact your child's school.



Agriculture Education and Pittsville FFA News and Notes...


The Pittsville Agriculture Education and FFA have once again had a busy few months. A reminder to people who bought labor from the FFA this past October: please contact those members to complete their work hours. It is always easier to complete the hour during the school year. On February 12, 2013 the Pittsville FFA will be competing in Stevens Point at the District Speaking Contest from 3:30-7:00 PM. Students from ten area schools will be competing to go onto the Sectional Contest held in March. The speaking contests include Quiz Bowl, Extemporaneous Speaking, Prepared, Creed, Interview, Parliamentary Procedure and Discussion Meet.



The Agriculture Education Department has been taking students and exploring the agriculture of Pittsville. The Agribusiness Class toured Nelson-Jameson, during their tour they interviewed Jerry Lippert, Lisa Schulz, and Devon Jones about what their jobs entailed during the day. The Large Animal Science Class recently visited Ronnie Cournoyer's Farm, Ronnie generously showed the students how to cut and wrap a whitetail deer. The students then learned to make jerky in the agriculture education room.

Nancy and Ray Stauner spoke to our class about their Elk Farm south of Pittsville. This is the fifth year we have visited. The class learned the trials and tribulations of raising elk. Some interesting points were: Nancy is an artist and Ray is a taxidermist, the elk are really hard on the fence with their antlers, and antlers fall off while horns do not. Other notables: this year they will remove the antlers to protect their animals from getting hurt, elk meat is a very healthy meat with low cholesterol, and elk go into rut from October through mid-November)during that time Ray and Nancy will not go into the pen because the aggressiveness of the bull). Jerry Meyer and Tim Eekhoff (MM Hog Farm) shared information about their hog operation. The students were able to learn by doing artificial insemination, cutting needle teeth, and giving shots. Brad Kremer (dairy) explained how his automated milking operation worked. Mr. Kremer explained advantages and disadvantages of have an automotive milking parlor. Dairy owner Matt Lippert showed and explained how his large herd operation worked each day beginning with the milking parlor and ending with a free stall barn.

FFA members Megan Christiansen, Emily Kissner, Connor Coyle, Cierra Coyle, Sam Solatycki, and FFA Alumni member Marv Kohlbeck dropped off FFA fruit to our senior citizens to wish them a happy holiday season.

High School Survival Biology Class

Over the past few weeks, Mr. Steward's Survival Biology class students worked on the skills necessary to survive different situations in the outdoors. As part of their course of study, learning to identify wild edible Wisconsin plants, constructing emergency shelters, fire starting with natural primitive materials, and building a Figure 4 Deadfall trap all challenged the students to "Survive" in the outdoors. Before starting these projects, the students learned how to utilize the tools on hand and improvise in order to overcome challenges in the outdoors.

All of the projects required the students to construct working models to illustrate their knowledge of outdoor skills. The trial and error and learning curve for the students as they worked on the projects was very evident in their completion of each project. For example; on one project each student started with three sticks less the 14 inches long and converted them into a working trap that could be used to harvest animals in the wild. Once completed, the students demonstrated their traps for all of the other students to observe and to share their knowledge and lessons learned. These hands-on type projects provide the students with problem solving skills necessary to survive in the outdoors and better prepare them for everyday life skills.

Throughout the class, students enjoy learning about and interacting in the outdoors when practicing survival techniques. The skills and knowledge learned are lifelong critical thinking skills that will afford them the ability to survive an array of emergency situations. The Survival Biology class is offered to Juniors and Senior students attending Pittsville High School.

8th Grade Entrepreneurship Class a Success

PHS History Classes Visit the High Ground

The US history classes of Mr. Downs and Mr. Piotrowski visited The High Ground Veterans Memorial Park on Tuesday, Dec 11, 2012. The classes were there to see an exhibit titled Fighting for Democracy on loan to The High Ground (THG) for the month of December from the Japanese American National Museum in Los Angeles, CA. The exhibit detailed the lives of seven US citizens of minority status (e.g. Mexican, African American, Jewish, Japanese) who served in the armed forces during World War II. The personal experiences of these men and women before, during and after the war, was presented in pictorial exhibits, documents and video. The main focus of the exhibit was to show how all these individuals suffered racial discrimination throughout their lives and in the military yet honorably served this country in time of war in whatever capacity they could. The exhibit was very informational and students learned a little about the war in general and a great deal about the social conditions and attitudes in the US during the 1940's. The students also did some research in the impressive resource library and viewed a slide show given by Volunteer General Manager Kirk Rodman on the history of THG. Mr. Rodman emphasized that The High Ground is "a veteran's memorial, not a war memorial". It is dedicated to the men and women who have served this country in the military. As a class, on December 19th we had sold 56 handled cutting boards and 45 American flag cutting boards. We sold the handled cutting boards for \$8 and the American Flag cutting board for \$12. The cutting boards are made out of red oak, white oak, walnut, cherry, ash, and maple wood. We have gotten compliments on our work from a number of buyers and non-buyers.

We believe, as a class, that we have done a good job making this product. The manufacturing group has far exceeded expectations of our classmates, teachers, and other people at making the cutting boards. We believe that this was a good experience for us to try, it really taught us a lot about how a business is run for real and gave us a taste of how it will be when we're out of school and have our own real jobs. The 8th grade Entrepreneurship class is taught by Mr. Stephen Hadfield and Mrs. Jennifer Jackson.


Cancellations, Delays, Early Dismissal
