From the Desk of District Administrator Terry Reynolds...



The Common Core State Standards have been in the news in past months. So what is all the fuss about? The Common Core State Standards is simply an effort to establish a single set of educational standards for grades K-12 in <u>Mathematics and English Language Arts</u>. 46 states and the District of Columbia voluntarily adopted the standards, which are designed to ensure that all students have the academic knowledge and skills they need to be successful after graduation from high school. It is surprising that a concerted voluntary effort to align expectations would receive any opposition.

The Common Core State Standards are internationally benchmarked against standards from some of the highest-performing countries (including Singapore and Japan). They are aligned with the ACT, the assessment all colleges and universities use to determine college readiness. Furthermore, the Common Core State Standards are based on research, student assessment data and input from educators, business, higher education, and the general public.

Several myths surround the Common Core State Standards. First, it is not "curriculum." The Common Core State Standards represents a set of reading, speaking, listening, and mathematics skills students should attain by graduation. School districts will continue to adopt their own curriculum just like they have in the past. Decisions about content, materials, and methods will continue to be made at the local level by educators, administrators, and boards of education who know their students and their community the best.

Another myth is that the Common Core State Standards are not rigorous enough. Although the Common Core State Standards are more rigorous than those currently used in nearly 40 states, they are not intended to be the "ceiling," but instead a **<u>baseline</u>** of the knowledge and skills that all students need in order to succeed in college and careers. Teaching to the Common Core State Standards will not limit students' learning potential or opportunities.

The movement toward the Common Core State Standards has already increased educator collaboration in Pittsville and across the states in the development of common assessments and model curricular and instructional materials in K-12. In colleges and universities, new educators will now be prepared based on a common set of standards. Resources currently being diverted to train/retrain educators can be used in other ways, such as customizing the standards based on their local needs and priorities and personalizing the learning experience for students.

In the interest of the students who will pursue a degree after high school, why would schools not teach to the standards required by postsecondary institutions which, as previously noted, are assessed on the ACT?

Skylert / SchoolMessenger Notification System

SchoolMessenger allows the district to quickly send mass notifications to employees, parents, and students. It can provide you with information through telephone or cell phone, e-mail, and/or text message. We will be using the system to let families know about emergency situations, weather related delays, cancellations, attendance, lunch balances, changes to athletic and other events, and general information about up-coming events.

Skylert works through Skyward's Family Access to provide you with the means to manage your contact sources and choose how you will be contacted for a variety of purposes. To check and update your Skylert contact information, go to our district home page at www.pittsville.k12.wi.us. Hover your mouse over 'Skyward' on the left side bar, click on the 'Family & Student Access' link from the pop-up menu, and login to your Family Access account. Click on the Skylert option listed on the left hand side. Click *Edit* to make changes to the information or to change your preference of notification delivery. You can add and remove checkmarks as you wish for the various types of contact calls, emails, or SMS text messages. Even though you may have checked phone numbers to receive SMS text messages, you must also 'opt in' to receive the services for each number.

According to the Future Ready Project (http://www.futurereadyproject.org/), voters believe it is "better for all states to have the same standards at each grade level in Math and English so students across the country have to meet the same expectations" rather than for states to have "their own standards reflecting their own priorities."

Teachers and educators all over Wisconsin have embraced this change. Despite decades in which new mandates and initiatives-those imposed externally from curriculum vendors, political bodies, and state and federal bureaucratic processes -have come and gone, our teachers are continually looking for ways to engage students and customize the learning process so that **all** students are successful. The Common Core State Standards represents a tool that, for the first time in our nation's history, would ensure that all students are held to the same expectations, regardless of zip code.

SENIORS

Upcoming Important Dates: Josten's Delivery Date: Tuesday, March 25 at 9:30 AM, Cafeteria (all unpaid balances due)

NEW--Awards Evening: Wednesday, May 21st at 7:00 PM, Auditorium (this will replace the traditional Awards Day morning held the *Friday prior to graduation*)

Graduation: Saturday, May 24th at 10:00 AM PHS Gymnasium (Senior Breakfast will be held prior at 8:30 AM in the cafeteria; all seniors must report to the LMC by 9:00 AM)

Paying for school: Scholarships, scholarships, scholarships! As most of you know, most local scholarships are due Friday, April 11th, but some are due before spring break. For more information, check out the Scholarship Tab (specifically 2013-2014 Scholarships and Contests) under High School Counseling on the PHS Home page. Also, please remember to complete your FAFSA before the priority date for your college; your 2013 taxes should be completed before you apply for the most accurate information.

Next Steps for post-secondary: Seniors attending a UW next fall are asked to take placement tests to determine what classes they should be placed in. Placement tests are administered March-July at numerous UW locations; students can register online at http://testing.wisc.edu/centerpages/regionaltesting.html. (There is also a link off the HS Counseling website under the "University of Wisconsin Information" tab.) Additionally, most schools require a housing deposit of some form this spring yet to secure a spot in the dorms; please make sure you have completed this step to guarantee yourself a spot with university housing next fall.

JUNIORS

Spring Campus Visits: Spring is great time for juniors to visit prospective campuses to get the "real feel" for campus life with classes still in session. Many colleges provide students and parents the opportunity to experience this together through their Preview Days programs.

Summer/Early Fall ACT Dates and Registration Deadlines: Students can register online at www.actstudent.org (There is also a link off the HS Counseling website under the "Testing" tab.)

- a. Test Date: June 14th, 2014—Registration Deadline: May 9th, 2014
 b. Test Date: September 13th, 2014—Registration Deadline: August 8th, 2014

Apply Early: Students who plan to attend *Mid State Technical College* after graduating can apply as early as 2nd semester of their junior year. This is a very smart thing to do as some programs fill up quickly (WELDING, NURSING, etc.) and applying early decreases the chance of being put on a wait list. Students need to take the Accuplacer or the ACT as part of the admissions process; the Accuplacer can be taken at PHS (see Mrs. Krystowiak to sign up,) the ACT needs to be taken at an official ACT testing site.

SOPHOMORES and FRESHMEN

Sophomore Meetings: All Sophomores will be finished with their spring meetings by the time spring break begins. Be sure to touch base with them to see what they discussed. The 20 minute meetings were very beneficial both academically and personally. Sophomore students are encouraged to get involved in extra-curricular activities so as to help them and the community they live in!

Freshmen Spring Meetings: All freshmen are asked to meet with Mrs. Krystowiak to discuss current high school goals and future plans. During these meetings, students are also encouraged to look for ways to volunteer in their free time and over the summer to begin building a strong scholarship résumé. Students are reminded to continue their career and post-secondary exploration and planning by using their WISCareers account and participating in a job shadow experience. Freshmen meetings will begin after spring break until the conclusion of the year.

8TH GRADERS

Recently, the 8^{th} grade was presented to on facts about depression and suicide. In addition to this, students were able to be screened if they chose to do so. This was a great opportunity for students to both learn and do a check-in on their mental health.

Greetings!

With snow piles starting to melt, a greater warmth felt by the sun, and a few bird-songs in the air, we can finally look forward to Spring being right around the corner. With such optimistic signs of the end of Winter around us, it seems like a great time to communicate some of the positive things that are happening at Pittsville High School.

Our first year administering the CTE Academy was a rousing success. There are two parts to the Academy; students study workplace skills, which include learning in a variety of areas, including resume' writing, working with difficult co-workers, career aptitude, strategic job searching, and many others. The second component of the Academy is workplace experience, which means juniors job-shadow at several different locations, and (most) seniors perform internships at various businesses in the region. A great thanks to former counselor Julia Backaus for getting this program started, as well as current counselor Emily Krystowiak and teachers Rae Ann Leonard, Stephen Hadfield, Bill Urban, and Kate Kaster for developing it and making it such a success in its first year. It has received such acclaim that Wisconsin Department of Workforce Development Secretary Reggie Newson will be visiting in April to learn about it, with the idea that the CTE Academy could be duplicated in other schools across the state.

We have finished our high-stakes testing for this year, which include the EXPLORE for freshmen, PLAN for sophomores, and ACT for juniors (a practice test this year). These tests will give students and families a wealth of information about how they compare academically with other students in the state and nation, as well as what classes they are ready to take in coming years here at the high school. They are also predictors of how ready they may be for college and technical school classes. Next year, these tests (to be called ASPIRE) will be mandated by the state, and will replace the WKCE test that has been used for the last 20+ years. As our freshman and sophomores have been taking the EXPLORE and PLAN for years now, we can establish a baseline of data which will help the faculty determine the needs of individual classes and students. Through this process, we hope to see student learning and achievement, as well as test scores, increase.

The scheduling process is finished for next year, and I would like to thank all of the parents that were part of the scheduling aspect of our Advising Program. With parents and advisors working closely with students, classes were chosen that were both of interest to the students and well-suited to move them toward their post-high school goals.

We had a great turnout for our dedication of the new school forest shelter and the celebration of Stephen Hadfield's State Environmental Educator of the Year Award. I see a great future of teaching environmental education at our school forest for years to come as we expand the program. This is just one more of many positive indicators of the forward movement of PHS and its students and staff. Similar to our anticipation of Spring, we are looking toward a bright future here at PHS.

PHS Math Department

Mr. Lilly, Math Instructor At the start of the new semester here at PHS, the math department enrolled a whole new set of students. I have found a neat activity to help prepare our students for the up and coming ACT exam. We do what is called ACT Tuesday. Every week, I give them a 12 minute, 12 question exam made up of retired ACT exam questions. When the 12 minutes have expired, we go over the answers as a group and we work through some of the problems that they got wrong. We address key skills that they will need to succeed at this high stakes test being taken by all juniors this year. In addition to seeing ACT type questions, they get use to taking timed tests that push them both mentally and academically.

English Classes Creating Drama

Students in Ms. Freedlund's English classes have been creating drama, literally, the past few weeks. In English 9 students have read and acted out William Shakespeare's tragedy, Romeo and Juliet. Students read as one character or several, depending on the size of the part, and really got to understand each character more deeply. Some students got into the 'act' by dressing in costume or using props relevant to the person they were portraying. (By far, any scene in which the freshmen boys could carry a plastic weapon was especially popular!) Hats and wigs borrowed from the PHS Drama Department proved to be a hit as well. All the students could relate to the themes of love and alienation in this classic. If you see a freshman, ask him or her to tell you what "Let lips do as hands do" or "Do you bite your thumb at me" means. Or have them explain why Romeo and Juliet are star-crossed lovers. Chances are they will tell you a whole lot more.

Advanced Placement Literature students were not to be out done by the freshmen. The juniors and seniors in this course read Death of a Salesman and will have completed Shakespeare's shortest history/tragedy Macbeth before Spring Break. AP students acted out the roles in Arthur Miller's Pulitzer Prize winning two act play, and have chosen to dramatically read the "Bard's Scottish Play". An underlying theme between the two plays is the protagonist's role as a Tragic Hero. A Tragic Hero is a noble or virtuous character who experiences a fall from grace. Both Willy Loman and Macbeth fit this literary description well. In addition. Semester One AP Literature students read George Bernard Shaw's play Pygmalion which was later recreated by Hollywood as My Fair Lady. Although by far, the most commented and drama-evoking literary selection this year was -Jane Eyre.

Dear families,

We have had a tremendously busy winter, despite having so many indoor recesses at the elementary school!

The staff and I have been working very hard on several new state and national initiatives. One is STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) and it will be project based activities for grades 3-8 next school year. In each of these grade levels, students will be able to create hands-on science experiments that also incorporate technology and math. The Next Generation Science Standards (http://www.nextgenscience.org) are important for students to know and be able to do as we look into College and Career Readiness. Not all students will become engineers, inventors or scientists, but we do need a scientifically literate population in the 21st century to understand things happening around the world. We are very excited to see students become more and more interested and engaged in science and hands-on experiments.

Another exciting initiative happening at Pittsville Elementary is PBIS Tier 2. We have been successful at Tier 1 with School Wide Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports, but the staff and I believe some of our students need more layers of support. The PBIS team and I have been going to training and learning about Check In Check Out systems for Tier 2. Some students benefit from this additional layer of support because it is rewarding and positive. Students who are nominated for this have a greeter on staff who talks with them at the beginning and end of the day, making sure things are going smoothly and the student has a chart that they take to each class. Each classroom teacher gives points for the student for a variety of things, including having homework turned in. At the end of each week, the student is rewarded for their effort.

The US Department of Education recently released the School Discipline Guidance Package (http://www.ed.gov/news/press-releases/us-departments-education-and-justicerelease-school-discipline-guidance-package-). I believe the school climate we have established at Pittsville Elementary aligns well with these guidelines.

The staff and I would like to thank everyone who came to the Learning Fair/Art Show/STEM night and Empty Bowls event on March 11. We raised over \$4,000.00 from Empty Bowls that will be donated to the Pittsville Food Pantry.

We will have an Early Release on Friday, March 28. Students will be dismissed at 12:30 pm. Spring Break is March 29-April 6. School resumes Monday, April 7.

Kindergarten Classroom Updates

Recently the kindergarten students have been learning about Community Helpers. The children were able to travel to Riverview Hospital in Wisconsin Rapids and toured a pediatric room and participated in lessons about the body. Students were shown proper hand washing techniques, learned about germs, listened to their heartbeat, and saw various instruments that doctors and nurses use in their jobs. The human skeleton was used to teach the children about how many bones are in their bodies, as well as to identify and compare a bone to its x-ray picture. We would like to thank the hospital auxiliary for providing the bus transportation fees for our trip. Our students also learned about Dental Health and we were fortunate to have Dr. John visit our classes and speak to the children about taking care of their teeth, so that they last them a lifetime. Children were able to model how to brush and floss their teeth using very large scale toothbrushes and floss (rope). The children shared ways they use their teeth and how to keep them healthy. A special thank you to Dr. John for providing our students with dental supplies for good hygiene.

A great addition to our curriculum this year was talking about the Post Office. Carmen Kumm, U.S. postal employee, shared with the students her duties at her job and brought examples of flats, bags, and boxes that are utilized in the mail room. She also spoke about the routes that the mail carriers have outside of the city limits. The children learned about things available for purchase at the post office, such as stamps, flat rate boxes, and special collector coins. The children were able to view a DVD from The Safe Side that addressed keeping themselves safe in many different locations and situations. We also read a story about Police officers and will soon be visited by Police Chief Zawislan and the K-9 unit. We look forward to this opportunity!

Later this spring, we will be going to the Pittsville Public Library where the children will learn about the job of a librarian, will be able to obtain their own library card, listen to stories, and become more familiar with what is available at the library.
