### From the Desk of Interim Superintendent Dr. Paul Vine ENERGY SAVINGS RETROFIT PROJECT UPDATE

Our Pittsville School District, like many PK-12 school districts, is constantly trying to find ways to do more with less. In recent years, the district was spending increasingly more money on utilities for lighting and heating. In addition, the district was forced to defer maintenance and safety updates due to lack of funding.

To try to get a handle on the issue and address the challenges, in the spring of 2014 the Pittsville School District embarked on a plan to develop, fund, and implement a comprehensive facility management plan. The goal of this plan is to evaluate, repair, and modernize facilities, while also controlling escalating energy costs, bring buildings up to code, and improve the learning environment by improving the comfort and safety for students and staff.

The District began working with Energy Services Group (ESG) to conduct a facility needs assessment. Based upon the assessment, ESG and district staff created a comprehensive list of projects. Included were measures to retrofit/update lighting, plumbing, controls, building exterior/envelop, and variable speed drives to be replaced throughout the district. It also proposed a new cooling tower at the high school, replacement roof at the elementary school, and updating the heating and ventilating system at the elementary school.

On October 13 and 16, 2014, the district held public informational meetings on the projects. On October 29, 2014, the school board approved the performance contract and a resolution to exceed the levy limits for debt service on the energy efficiency financing for \$2,415,000. This resolution also identified required performance indicators that will measure energy savings/or energy cost avoidance in an amount equal to the exemption request. Essentially, the upgrades will provide at least an annual guaranteed savings of \$57,830 of which the district will use to offset the cost of the project and pay back the debt each year.

In May of 2014, the district commissioned with Energy Services Group. During the fall of 2014, Energy Services Group worked with district staff to plan for the completion of most of the projects in the summer of 2015. Included were projects to replace energy management systems and controls for heating and ventilation, upgrades for lighting, structural improvements to reduce air leakage, and replacement of the cooling tower at the high school. By November 2015, almost all (or ninety-nine percent) of the projects have been completed. We continue to monitor the overall savings and utilize the savings to pay for the projects.

Overall, we are extremely pleased with the facility and HVAC, lighting, and structural upgrades. We continue to work with Honeywell to analyze the future savings that will occur. ### "Counselor's Corner: 2nd Quarter" - Emily Krystowiak, 8-12 School Counselor

As we come to a close on the end of first semester, please keep the following points of information in mind to plan ahead for a successful spring.

**Seniors:** Please continue to work on **scholarships** and stay tuned for the local scholarships which will be posted by the end of January. Most local scholarships are due Friday, April 1<sup>st</sup>, but some are due <u>sooner</u>. For more information, check out the Scholarship Tab under High School Counseling on the PHS Home page. Also, please remember to complete your **FAFSA** before the priority date for your college; your 2015 taxes should be completed before you apply for the most accurate information. Financial Aid night will be held on January 26, 2016 at 6:00 p.m. in the auditorium. **Juniors:** If you are planning to **register for the ACT** this spring, please make sure you register online before the registration date ends to avoid paying a late fee. Students can register online at <u>www.actstudent.org.</u> (*There is also a link off the HS Counseling website under the "Testing" tab.*) Spring test dates include:

- a. Test Date: February 6, 2016-Registration Deadline PAST: January 8, 2016
- b. Test Date: April 9, 2016—Registration Deadline: March 4, 2016
- c. Test Date: June 11, 2016—Registration Deadline: May 6, 2016

As a reminder, the state required ACT will be offered at school on March 1 & 2, 2016. This test can be used for college entrance if they'd like. Students must indicate this during the time of the test. Students who plan to attend Mid State Technical College after graduating should consider taking the **Accuplacer** this spring as well. The Accuplacer can be taken at PHS and does not require an official registration. Students should see the school counselor to sign up.

**Sophomores, Freshmen, and 8th Grade:** As we head into the registration for next year, please make sure you are taking time to plan out your courses based on what is best for your future. To assist in this process, sophomores & 8<sup>th</sup> graders should attend "Your Future is Now Night" on January 25<sup>th</sup> at 6:00 pm at the high school. This evening is designed for students to look ahead to their beginning and final years of high school and taking the proper classes that will help them achieve success. In addition to this, during 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> term, freshmen and sophomore individual planning conferences will be held to discuss current high school goals and future plans. During these meetings, students are also encouraged to look for ways to volunteer in their free time and over the summer to begin building a strong scholarship résumé. Students are reminded to continue their career and post-secondary exploration and planning by using their WISCareers account.

### New Science Elective Classes for 2016-2017

The Life Science area is offering two new science elective classes in the 2016 – 2017 school year. The new electives will be taught by Mr. Steward for sophomore through senior students at Pittsville High School.

The first new elective class will be **Zoology - From The Birds To The Bees** - is the study of animals - but animals are in ecosystems, so other living and non-living aspects of our world will be incorporated. This scientific course is designed to teach students the basic principles of the diversity of life through the application of identification, classification, their structure, embryology, evolution, habitats, and their interaction/distribution throughout their ecosystem and the world. We will examine fish, mammals, insects, reptiles, birds, etc. utilizing the school forest and public lands. Zoologists research everything they think to ask about animals.

The second new elective class will be **Science Issues - Past, Present and Future** - is designed to provide students with the basic principles and concepts of the ever-changing environment of the scientific community. Building on the experiences and prior knowledge that the students bring to this course, we will engage in a series of conversations, projects, and laboratory exercises to explore and examine a series of topics related to science. Topics are based on student interest and some themes may include scientific breakthroughs, cyborgs, biological and chemical warfare, chymosin, medicines, Ebola outbreak, the mission to Mars, performing enhancing drugs, vaccinations, etc.



### English Department News Story Corps

Students in Ms. Freedlund's classes used Thanksgiving Break to interview family members and friends to complete a national program called "The Great Thanksgiving Listen" (GTL). The GTL is part of the StoryCorps project. StoryCorps was founded in 2003 as a way to record oral history via one-on-one interviews. Interviews for this class project were recorded using the StoryCorps App, digitally recorded, or handwritten by the student interviewer. Interviews recorded on the app will be edited and saved as part of the American Folklore Center at the Library of Congress. The program provided tips and questions for the participants. Over 60 students at Pittsville High School shared their interviews with their class.

Students in Composition II have been busy improving their writing skills after testing for the English 102 Placement test on Monday, October 19 administered by Steve Kaiser from UW-Marshfield/Wood County. Students who tested into English 102 will be able to earn Dual Credit (1 from PHS; 3 from "The Wood") accepted as college credit at any Wisconsin campus.

The freshmen in Ms. Freedlund's English 9 class enjoyed acting out the play *Romeo* and Juliet and the novel *To Kill a Mockingbird* after completing a Short Story Unit. The top five stories were written by Colleen Lassa, Emma Miller, Amanda Ortner, Amanda Piotrowski, and Hunter Wilke.

Advance Placement Literature and Composition has been focusing on recognizing and applying various literary terms. Students have taken several AP format multiple choice tests and written many literary analysis essays. A specific focus has been on improving Introductions, Conclusions, and Thesis Statements. The students also read books from the AP Open Question: Of Mice and Men and Macbeth as well as several poems and short stories. AP students enjoyed a break from the testing by modeling the writing process using playdough.

Four sets of junior fire gear were purchased for students to wear – the intent here is to constantly remind them that firefighters may be dressed in big scary uniforms and they should not be afraid. The ensemble includes a jacket, pants and helmet with the PFD logo on them.

The final purchase most recently made is for a rescue auger –the auger is used in grain entrapment to help remove flowing grain away from trapped individuals.

### **BREAKFAST PROGRAM**

The **High School** will serve breakfast during PPT time and the students will take the food items to their next class.

The **Elementary School** will be serving breakfast at 8:00 am. Students that would like breakfast will first report to their classrooms, and then come down to the cafeteria for breakfast. Grades 4Kgn-3<sup>rd</sup> will be issued a breakfast card in the classroom to be turned in at the breakfast line. Grades 4<sup>th</sup>-8<sup>th</sup> will punch in their lunch numbers before going through the lines. School breakfast is an ideal solution on busy mornings when students are running late or parents have to be at work early. The cost is only \$1.00. Students that qualify for free or reduced lunch receive free breakfast.

### ONLINE PAYMENTS ARE EASY AND CONVIENENT

Parents can make online payments from home or work, 24/7. If their child's food service balance is low, it only takes a few minutes to add money to it using their VISA or MasterCard credit or debit card (*NOTE: your credit card will be charged \$2.50 for the convenience of making an online payment*). Payments are made through the student's Skyward Family Access account.

The free or reduced lunch program not only benefits families but it also helps your school. Your application is completely confidential. ### DOUBLE UP and SIGNATUTURE ENTRÉE SALADS

We will be offering a second entrée "DOUBLE UP" again this year for grades 6-12. ### LOW LUNCH BALANCES

Accounts below \$25.00 will be notified weekly through the Pittsville School District's SchoolMessenger alert system. The notice explains that your family food service funds are running low and money should be added as soon as possible.

If a family account gets below zero, a notice will be sent out stating if the amount due is not paid in three working days, your children will no longer be able to participate in the breakfast and/or lunch program. If no money is received, a note will go home explaining the account is closed and Pittsville Schools will no longer be providing breakfast, lunch, or milk. It is then the parent's responsibility to provide their child with a lunch from home. Once money is added, your children may again participate in the school's food service programs.

Here are a few tips to insure your family food service account is up-to-date and in good standing.

- Check with your answering machines and email to see if your family received an alert message concerning a low lunch balance.
- If you received a notice, please send payment as soon as possible.
- When sending in a payment, please include your family name and amount sent.

It can provide you with information through telephone or cell phone, e-mail, and/or text message. We will be using the system to let families know about emergency situations, weather related delays, <u>cancellations</u>, attendance, lunch balances, changes to athletic and other events, and general information about up-coming events.

<u>Skylert</u> works through <u>Skyward's Family Access</u> to provide you with the means to manage your contact sources and choose how you will be contacted for a variety of purposes. To check and update your *Skylert* contact information, go to our district home page at <u>www.pittsville.k12.wi.us</u>. Hover your mouse over 'Skyward' on the left side bar, click on the 'Family & Student Access' link from the pop-up menu, and login to your <u>Family Access account</u>. Click on the **Skylert** option listed on the left hand side. Click **Edit** to make changes to the information or to change your preference of notification delivery. You can add and remove checkmarks as you wish for the various types of contact calls, emails, or SMS text messages. Even though you may have checked phone numbers to receive SMS text messages, you must also 'opt in' to receive the services for each number.

Highlights for the season included a 10-2 record in duals and Dennis Grutzik, Dan Hahn, Rick Winters and Bryan Friedrichsen all earning Marawood Conference Champ titles in their respective weight classes. Dennis Grutzik was also a Regional and Sectional champ and a State Qualifier.
