From the Desk of Interim Superintendent Dr. Paul Vine

As the recently hired Interim-Superintendent, it is my privilege to join your community and serve the Pittsville School District. I grew up and went to school in Neillsville. Following high school, I attended UW-La Crosse, where I played basketball for four years and graduated with a degree in Health and Physical Education.

My teaching career began in 1979 in Bayfield as Health/Phy. Ed. Teacher as well as Head Boys' Basketball Coach. During that time, I also attended UW-Superior to earn my Master's Degree in Educational Administration. Between 1987 and 1996, I served as an Assistant Principal at River Falls High School, Eau Claire Memorial and in Arcadia as High School Principal.

While working during that time, I earned my Doctorate Degree in Educational Leadership from St. Thomas University in St. Paul, MN. From 1994 to 1998, I was Superintendent of the Colby Area School District, and from 1998 to 2011 Superintendent of the Rice Area School District. In 2012 to June 30, 2015, I worked as Independence School District Superintendent and Elementary Principal. I am very excited to spend this school year with Pittsville students, staff and community.

In the spring of 2015 Kelley and I completed construction on our "dream" home on my family farm located between Neillsville and Granton. Kelley is insurance nurse who works for the Gundersen Health System. In 2014 she was able to work from home which she continues to do from our new home. I am also blessed with three adult daughters 28, 29, and 31 living in Minneapolis, Lander WY and Medlin, Columbia.

As a veteran educator, I have had opportunities to work in both large and small school districts, where I have concluded all students can learn. As the world continues to shrink, it is imperative students in public education are prepared to work in a changing world, be able to think critically, as well as understand the importance of becoming a lifelong learner. To ensure our students receive the best education possible, we must strive to support our teachers and staff by providing relevant staff development as well as by hiring and retaining the best teachers possible.

As the Superintendent of the Independence School District, we initiated a community fitness center in our school. We implemented Response to Intervention (RTI) and greatly improved our reading and math scores. We also invested \$125,000 in new wiring closets and 50 wireless access points. We also purchased and 275 MacPro laptops for all students in 6-12 grade as well as Pk-12 teachers.

While In Rice Lake, we implemented Reading Recovery for students who were struggling with reading and writing. In addition, we started an after-school program, in conjunction with the local Boys' and Girls' Club, which regularly served over 25 percent of our students. We initiated an on-line charter school for home schooled students as well as for students from other districts. With the support of \$1.9 million in donations from local citizens and businesses, we were able to construct a \$4 million outdoor athletic complex. Another highlight was successfully passing a \$4 million referendum to update our energy plant, which reduced our energy costs annually by \$125,000 -\$150,000.

In addition to my work as an educator, I have also been very involved in a variety of community activities. As a Rotarian and past president, I initiated and helped coordinate bringing a Feed My Starving Children mobile packing event to Rice Lake, where each year over 700 community volunteers packed 150,000 meals that were delivered to starving children around the world. I was active in my church and was also a founding member and past president of the Barron County Restorative Justice Program. I have served on the Wisconsin Indianhead Technical College Board of Directors. I am an avid cyclist, golfer, and hunter. Along with two of my five siblings, I own and operate a Christmas tree farm near Neillsville.

My contract with the district is for 2-4 days per week, depending on needs, through June 2016. I look forward to working together to achieve the mission and goals of the Pittsville School District.

Pittsville Juniors Attend Wisconsin Education Fair at MSTC & Tour UWSP - October 2, 2015. Pittsville juniors had the opportunity to visit with college reps from over 90 different colleges and universities across the Mid-West region at the annual Wisconsin Education Fair held at MSTC on September 19, 2014. Juniors were able to obtain information for schools they may be interested in attending. From there, they traveled to UWSP and received a campus tour. This gave them first-hand experience of what a college campus is like. Students will be discussing their experience during their Junior Conference which will be held in November or December.

Teen Leadership Council Continues. TLC mentor students are continuing to meet with their assigned mentee group twice a month, once during lunch and once during RTI/PPT, to do different team building activities as well as discuss school and life topics. Mentee groups are consistent from last year being that 7^{th} grade students are paired with 10^{th} grade mentors, 8^{th} grade students are paired with 11^{th} grade mentors, and 9^{th} grade students are paired with 12^{th} grade mentors. TLC mentor students have met four times already this year with their students over the last month and half of school. We continue to encourage mentee's to take full advantage of this time with their mentors.

Pittsville 8th grade students attend "Heavy Metal" Tour on October 7, 2015. The 8th grade class had a unique opportunity to participate in the Heavy Metal tour that was put on by the Marshfield Area Chamber of Commerce on October 7th. All students were able to tour three area businesses - H & S and Paget Welding in Marshfield and Colby Metal in Colby. Students were able to see what manufacturing in Wisconsin looks like up and close. The day ended with a lunch at Mid-State Technical College in Marshfield where students received final instruction on the benefits of working in these types of industries.

To trim a bowl, it is placed upside down and the excess clay from throwing is removed. Volunteers will be taught how to trim the bowls on the pottery wheels. For those of you inquiring about donating soup: According to the Department of Health, soup donations need to be prepared in a license kitchen as well as prepared on the same day of the event so there is no cooling or reheating involved. If you are interested in helping out, monetary donations can be made towards soup preparation since we cannot take soup donations from private dwellings.

The end of Term 1 and beginning of Term 2 have come upon us very quickly. We are 25% of the way through the school year already! There is a special climate in the school this year; one I am very delighted to see. Student behavior in the school has been stellar. You see it in the hallways and the classrooms, with students working together, being respectful, and having fun. And, academically, students and staff have set rigorous goals, and are working hard to achieve them.

Homecoming was a wonderful example of the student's maturity and commitment to PHS. The halls were decorated with taste and skill, modeling with perfection the theme of world geography. The lunchtime competitions, assembly, and dance were all well attended by positive, happy students. And winning the football game wasn't bad either!

Part of the staff's work during our pre-school inservice was to use student testing data to set goals for each class. They customized each course that they are teaching based on the strengths and weaknesses of the students that are enrolled. That is a highly effective method to help students achieve at the highest level possible. The staff also set goals for each class based on that data, as follows:

Freshman Aspire test goal: 430 Sophomore Aspire test goal: 434 Junior ACT test goal: 20.5

In addition, students each set individual goals for their grades and the spring Aspire/ACT tests. Ask your child what their goals are; support from home is one of the most important factors in student achievement. We will continue to emphasize goal setting and the hard work it takes to achieve them in our advising program as the school year rolls on.

There is an obvious feeling of pride here at PHS. We have received many compliments on the cleanliness of our schools (visiting teams), the politeness of our students (substitute teachers), and the quality of our facilities ("Splash of Red" tourists from out-of-state). Our Panther Pride is showing through, both in conduct and scholarship, which makes the principal very proud.

ENGLISH DEPARTMENT

In English 10, students have been hard at work assembling poetry and practicing spoken word poems. Some activities so far have included observing and analyzing spoken word poets, scouring magazines to create found poetry and blackout poems, and strengthening their skills by authoring different types of poetic forms such as limericks, sonnets and odes.

In Outdoor literature, students have fiercely debated the pros and cons of de-extinction and the environmental impact of reviving extinct species. Coming off that debate, the class has begun to explore the works of Edward Abbey and the impact of eco-terrorism: When does activism turn bad, and how?

In English 8, students have been moving through The Outsiders by S.E. Hinton. The book covers some of the most difficult challenges faced by adolescents: Where do I fit in, and how do I know? Who can I trust? Is doing the wrong thing for the right reasons ever justified? Students grapple with these ideas through the writing of MELCon paragraphs and class discussion.

MATH STUDENTS ASSIST MSTC IN SURVEYING CROSS COUNTRY COURSE

Six students from Mid-State Technical College visited Pittsvilles' Algebra classes and cross country course in September. They brought with them GPS surveying equipment and demonstrated the device's use while collecting data on the running course. The devices that the student groups used are some of the newest equipment used in building and designing roads. Many of our students volunteered to try out the equipment (valued at \$25,000) while Mid State had it on school grounds to be used.

Mid-State's instructors, Greg Webster and Mike Johnson, also demonstrated some of the Auto-CAD software that the students are learning, and how this tool will be used to help create a three dimensional map of our cross country course. This map will then be available to coaches and be used to plan running strategies for years to come.

Mid State has a number of engineering programs that are training students in this field. There are no technical programs in the northern portion of our state offering such training and therefore employers from all over the state are creating a demand for trained professionals in these areas.

Thank you to Mid-State for reaching out to high schools and helping students become aware of opportunities that they have right here in central Wisconsin, and for creating a finished map project that will contribute to our sports program in the future.

Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) is a school wide system we are using so we can be more proactive with our approach in guiding students toward appropriate behavior. This system has a universal base for teaching social skills along with the ability to individualize strategies for those who need more guidance. This will be our fourth year consistently using PBIS and our school has even been recognized as a School of Merit for the past two years!

The four Panther Traits that we follow at Pittsville Elementary are Respectful, Responsible, Honorable, and Engaged. We encourage students to follow these traits at school, on field trips, in our community, and at home. When we see students at school following these traits we recognize them in several ways including giving students a golden ticket, recognizing them as Student of the Month for their grade, giving them a shout out on Friday's announcements, or recognizing an entire class for a Golden Award.

We have more fun and exciting ideas to implement this school year to recognize all our wonderful students so stay tuned!



WHAT IS HAPPENING IN SCIENCE?

6th grade is learning about the Periodic Table by doing an investigation into a recyclable element. They are working on organizing it in Google Presentation and they are presenting them to their fellow classmates.

7th grade is gaining wisdom on the equation of life—Photosynthesis/Respiration. They could choose between a variety of projects from making a children's book, a travel brochure or writing a story about how both work. Students needed to be creative in their explanation of Photosynthesis and Respiration as they worked with a partner.

8th grade worked on designing and making a dam that would hold back water in a flower box to help understand water forces in a unit on erosion and deposition. This was quite a challenge as they were also to try and make it so that water could be released. This challenge was met head on and in the end while dams held back water some was able to find a weak spot and sneak under.

STEM – Whole group: 8th grade is working on designing wind cars from straws, life savers and paper. Next, students will design cars that can use gravity for energy, they will go down a ramp.

BREAKFAST PROGRAM

Students that qualify for free or reduced lunch receive free breakfast.

LOW LUNCH BALANCES

Accounts below \$25.00 will be notified weekly through the Pittsville School District's SchoolMessenger alert system. The notice explains that your family food service funds are running low and money should be added as soon as possible.

If a family account gets below zero, a notice will be sent out stating if the amount due is not paid in three working days, your children will no longer be able to participate in the breakfast and/or lunch program. If no money is received, a note will go home explaining the account is closed and Pittsville Schools will no longer be providing breakfast, lunch, or milk. It is then the parent's responsibility to provide their child with a lunch from home. Once money is added, your children may again participate in the school's food service programs.

Here are a few tips to insure your family food service account is up-to-date and in good standing.

- Check with your answering machines and email to see if your family received an alert message concerning a low lunch balance.
- If you received a notice, please send payment as soon as possible.
- When sending in a payment, please include your family name and amount sent.

ENTREPRENEURSHIP - SHARK TANK PROJECT

Students began the Shark Tank project by assuming the role of an entrepreneur tasked with devising a proprietary, practical invention that can be a product or service. They then developed a business plan for their invention while, along the way, learning important business concepts, specifically critical thinking and problem solving.

In developing their inventions, students learned about the importance of legally protecting their company via patents, the costs associated with leasing a space to conduct business operations, determining the costs of goods sold, distribution methods, marketing tactics and total start-up funds. Skills learned in English class were reinforced, in that each Shark Tank assignment was accepted only if was structurally and grammatically correct.

At the project's completion, students created a prototype and pitched their invention to real business owners, who judged and critiqued the proposals.
