Food Service News

BREAKFAST. The **High School** is serving breakfast during PPT time and the students will take the food items to their next class. The **Elementary School** is serving breakfast at 8:00 am. Students that would like breakfast will first report to their classrooms, and then come down to the cafeteria. Grades 4Kgn-3rd will be issued a breakfast card in the classroom to be turned in at the breakfast line. Grades 4th-8th will punch in their lunch numbers before going through the lines. School breakfast is an ideal solution on busy mornings when students are running late or parents have to be at work early. The cost is only \$1.00. Students that qualify for free or reduced lunch receive free breakfast.

ONLINE PAYMENTS ARE EASY AND CONVIENENT. Parents can make online payments from home or work, 24/7. If their child's food service balance is low, it only takes a few minutes to add money to it using their VISA or MasterCard credit or debit card (NOTE: your credit card will be charged \$2.50 for the convenience of making an online payment). Payments are made through the student's Skyward Family Access account.

LOW LUNCH BALANCES

Accounts below \$25.00 will be notified weekly through the Pittsville School District's SchoolMessenger alert system. The notice explains that your family food service funds are running low and money should be added as soon as possible.

If a family account gets below zero, a notice will be sent out stating if the amount due is not paid in three working days, your children will no longer be able to participate in the breakfast and/or lunch program. If no money is received, a note will go home explaining the account is closed and Pittsville Schools will no longer be providing breakfast, lunch, or milk. It is then the parent's responsibility to provide their child with a lunch from home. Once money is added, your children may again participate in the school's food service programs.

Here are a few tips to insure your family food service account is upto-date and in good standing.

- Check with your answering machines and email to see if your family received an alert message concerning a low lunch balance.
- If you received a notice, please send payment as soon as possible.
- When sending in a payment, please include your family name and amount sent.



PHS Competes at Math League

On November 10, twelve Pittsville high school students traveled to the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point to participate in the first meet for the High School Math League Competition. The competition has 3 categories: Algebra, Geometry, and Advanced Math. Forty-nine different schools brought their top math students to compete in the competition.

The four students who represented Pittsville School District in the Geometry category were Trayson Ortner, Drew Bratlie, Evan Roberts, and Paeton Scholzen. Henry Myers, Hanna Tarazi Baron, Matthew Grossman, and Leah Kumm took the challenging Algebra 2 test. The four students competing in the Advanced Math category were Teodora Gruijic, Tyler Carlson, Brett Peters, and Josh Zogleman. All students worked hard and scored points for their team. In school size three, there were about 44 students taking each test. For Geometry, Trayson placed in the top ten in 7th place. In the Algebra category, Henry Myers placed in the top half with 16th place. The Advanced category is always a challenging test and this year Teodora placed 6th and Josh placed 15th out of 44 students. The next competition is January 25th and the final competition is April 5th.

Vet and Small Animal Science Class

Brooke Darr and Kara Peterson recently brought their Saint Bernard dogs into the Vet and Small Animal Science Class. Both Brooke and Kara researched the history of their dogs and reported their findings to the class. For instance, Saint Bernard's were brought to Switzerland by the Roman Army.

Human Anatomy & Physiology

Mr. Steward's Human Anatomy & Physiology students are currently studying the cardiovascular system. As part of their course of study, learning about the flow of blood through the heart and body takes on a whole new concept as students literally walk through the human heart. First, all structures and anatomical features that make up the human heart were covered in class with the students. Then, over the course of two days, students drew the human heart and all of its internal structures.

The heart drawing included all of the veins and arteries entering and leaving the heart, the left and right atriums and ventricles, along with all of the valves that assist in regulating blood flow. Once completed, the students were quizzed on identifying the heart structures as they walk through the heart demonstrating the flow of blood. Students walked from vein to atrium, past valve to ventricles, to arteries to the lungs and back to the heart where it enters the atrium to ventricle and finally making their way out of the heart to the rest of the body.

Students enjoy learning about the human heart and how it functions to provide the body with vital oxygen while removing cellular waste.

1st Grade News

Academic and Career Planning

When speaking to parents and reminiscing about their school days, we at school hear "They never prepared us for life after graduation" or "We didn't receive any planning information". Well, we hope that times like these are coming to an end. The 21st century is ever changing, more so than when we were kids and those reasons hopefully are becoming as obsolete as some of the technology that was used back in the day. Which brings us to today and what we are doing about those exact phrases here in the Pittsville School District.

Academic and Career Planning (ACP) has held a place within these school walls since obsolete technology was introduced. It has ebbed and flowed at various times and stages, but more so now than ever it is present within multiple realms of our school education. Whether it be from career searches in junior high to resume writing in high school English, measures are being taken to make sure that students here are receiving proper information and training so they are the most informed and prepared for upon graduation.

All learning does not happen within the school walls. Learning happens at home and in our communities and that is as equally important. A combination of school, home, and community provides an excellent environment for students to achieve their full potential. This is excellent news, because this is what has already been happening and what we hope will continue to flourish as Academic & Career Planning takes a bigger role.

ACP is a student-driven, adult-supported process in which students create and cultivate their own unique and information-based visions for post-secondary success, obtained through self-exploration, career exploration, and the development of career management and planning skills.

Starting in the 2017-18 school year, all students in grades 6-12 will be required by the state of Wisconsin to participate in ACP activities. Luckily for our students, this is something they have already been working on. Starting this year, students in grades 6-12 have been using Career Cruising to take assessments to learn about skills and abilities, search for careers and colleges, and find out information on financial aid. All parents can be given access to a parent portal to follow what their child has been doing. Business Education

The 8th grade entrepreneurship class created a business called Mugs n' Stuff. The class was expected to write a resume, which would then get them into one of the five different departments: accounting, marketing, manufacturing, packaging, or designing.

Over the course of nine weeks, the class sold over \$2,000 in custom mugs, mug trees, and mug racks. In total, the class profited over \$750. The student employees were not just working for nothing, with all the time that they spent working for the company they will receive custom money designed by the accounting team. This money will be spent on an auction that will be held on the last day of the term.

English Department Activities

Students in Ms. Freedlund's Composition II, English 9 Honors, and AP Language and Composition shared two assignments recently. The first assignment was an essay contest sponsored by the Fleet Reserve (Retired Navy, Coast Guard, and Marines). This year's prompt proved to be more difficult than some years, "What Memorial Day means to me". In 350 words or less, student writers from grades 9-12 wrote about the national holiday, and how it differs from Veterans Day. Winners of this completion can win \$100 locally.

The second assignment was an oral history project sponsored by StoryCorps called the Great Thanksgiving Listen. The Great Thanksgiving Listen works in conjunction with NPR and the Library of Congress to record oral history. Students are asked to interview an older relative or neighbor about what life was like when they were younger.

We heard stories of the innovative way to protect your knees when you were roller skating (Kotex pads), April Fool's jokes on a husband (replaced his cash with Monopoly money), and selling the family car to pay the bills when the husband was overseas serving in the military. Other topics covered were how couples met: blind date, running into the girl's car on purpose, and pulling a girl's hair in class to get her attention. Some families used creative ways to name their children (all had the same middle name), how one relative started a fire that almost burned the school down. and meeting famous people like Roy Rogers. Relatives described learning to drive a stick, starting a bar fight, and teaching family members to vodel. Several students brought in photographs of their family. We heard stories that were funny, entertaining, and even sad. One student even brought in her relative's Purple Heart.

Applications have been available online since October 1, 2016 at: http://www.fafsa.ed.gov/ (*There is also a link off the HS Counseling website.*) If help is needed to fill out this form, please head to North Central Technical College on Saturday, January 28, at 10:00 a.m. Just by attending, students can be entered to win a drawing for a scholarship!

Juniors: If you are planning to **register for the ACT** this spring, please make sure you register online before the registration date ends to avoid paying a late fee. Students can register online at www.actstudent.org (There is also a link off the HS Counseling website under the "Testing" tab.) Spring test dates include:

- a. Test Date: February 11, 2017 Registration Deadline: January 13, 2017
- b. Test Date: April 8, 2017 Registration Deadline: March 3, 2017
- c. Test Date: June 10, 2017 Registration Deadline: May 5, 2017

As a reminder, the state required ACT will be offered at school on February 28 & March 1, 2017. This test can be used for college and technical school entrance. Students must indicate their four choices at the time of the test. If students miss one of both of the required test dates, make up is mandatory during spring break on the mornings of March 21 and 22.

Sophomores, Freshmen, and 8th Grade: As we head into the registration for next year, please make sure you are taking time to plan out your courses based on what is best for your future. To assist in this process, sophomores and 8th graders should attend "Your Future is Now Night" on **February 1 at 6:00** pm at the high school. This evening is designed for students to look ahead to their beginning and final years of high school and taking the proper classes that will help them achieve success. Those students whose parents attend this evening, will be able to register first amongst their classmates on their designated registration date. In addition to this, during 3rd and 4th term, freshmen and sophomore **individual planning conferences** will be held to discuss current high school goals and future plans. During these meetings, students are also encouraged to look for ways to **volunteer** in their free time and over the summer to begin building a strong scholarship résumé. Students are reminded to continue their career and post-secondary exploration and planning by using their Career Cruising accounts.
