### Counselor's Corner: 4th Quarter - Emily Krystowiak, 8-12 School Counselor

#### What can I do this summer? Volunteer, volunteer!

One of the most common questions I hear from both students and parents is, "How can I (or my student) win scholarships my (his/her) senior year?" My answer very simply is volunteer, volunteer, volunteer! Most scholarship committees follow the "ACE rule" (Academic Excellence, Community Service, and Extra Curricular Involvement) when selecting their recipients. As I tell students, in this current day and age, it is not enough to simply get good grades and be involved in a few clubs and/or sports. While those aspects are certainly good and looked upon favorably, what tends to set the winners of multiple scholarships apart from those who only receive one or two is the amount of "genuine" community service they have done over the course of their high school career. To be counted as high school community service, students can start volunteering as early as the summer before their freshmen year. Community service can typically be any service done for another person (non-relative) or agency that is not compensated monetarily or by other means. A great place to start at when looking for places to volunteer is the United Way of Inner Wisconsin which looks to match volunteers with local places/events in need of help; for more information visit their website at <a href="https://www.uwiw.org">www.uwiw.org</a> and click on volunteer. Enjoy your summer and happy volunteering!

#### **Important Reminders for the Class of 2017:**

- 1. Request your final transcripts through Parchment: All students attending a post-secondary institution will need to submit their final transcripts through Parchment, our online transcript service. (Please see the link off the high school home page to get started with this process.) Please remember to do this sooner than later as your acceptance to your school is still considered "conditional" until they receive your final high school transcripts.
- 2. *Complete your FAFSA ASAP:* If you have not already done so, please complete your FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) as soon as possible so you are eligible for more aid. Your 2016 taxes should be completed before you apply for the most accurate information. Applications are available online at: <a href="http://www.fafsa.ed.gov/">http://www.fafsa.ed.gov/</a>
- 3. *UW Placement Tests Registration:* Seniors attending a UW next fall are asked to take placement tests to determine what classes they should be placed in. Placement tests are administered March-July at numerous UW locations; students can register online at <a href="http://testing.wisc.edu/centerpages/regionaltesting.html">http://testing.wisc.edu/centerpages/regionaltesting.html</a>

#### **Important Reminder for Juniors: Class of 2018**

Planning to attend a WI Technical College after high school? Apply Now! Many of the WI technical colleges (MSTC, NTC, etc.) accept applications from students at the end of their junior year. Applying early is **highly recommended** especially if a student is applying to a program that typically has a wait list (health care programs, welding, etc.) Please check the application process information on the specific technical school website for more information.

A huge change in the application process for MSTC recently took place. Students no longer need a high school transcript to apply. After students submit their applications and \$30 fee, they will be accepted. A student advising session will be required next and at that time, a transcript is recommended to bring. #### Spanish News....

Each of the three Spanish classes have just finished reading a novel. Level one read a story about pirates and a secret island! Level two explored Guatemala's history and culture by reading a novel about a family that emigrates in 1989. The novel is based on a true story, which brims with hope for the future. Level four students read a novel exploring life as a Republican in Spain during the Spanish Civil War (1936-1939). They also completed a film study based on the civil war, which allowed them to connect history with a variety of narratives. All three novels are completely in Spanish. Students did a fantastic job comprehending their novels!

#### **FCCLA**

On February 4th, the Pittsville FBLA headed to their regional competition in Nekoosa. Over thirty members competed in various presentation or objective test events. Eleven Pittsville students will now be moving on to the state competition in Appleton. There, they will be competing in various events such as entrepreneurship, business law, sales presentation, and emerging business issues.







For the seventh straight year, Mr. Steward's 10<sup>th</sup> grade Biology students conducted a Rusty Crayfish Trapping lab in conjunction with Tracy Arnold from the Wood County Land Conservation Office. The goal of the lab is to calculate the numbers of invasive Rusty Crayfish that are present in the Yellow River. The section of the Yellow River that passes on the west side of the City of Pittsville and Pittsville High School was used to conduct the lab.

Students placed 13 traps in the river at different depths, in different substrates, and using different baits. Every Monday, Wednesday, and Friday – water levels permitting - the traps were check and water temperature measured. Each crayfish caught are sexed, measured, and stored in plastic bags. The crayfish are frozen and will be transported to Bay Beach Wildlife Sanctuary to feed their animals later this month. At the end of the four-week lab survey, the students will tabulate their numbers caught in the traps. Students will then write a scientific lab paper analyzing their data and findings from the trapping.

This year, Tracy Arnold, along with article and photographic input from Laney Garrels, Paula Alvarez, and Sarah Downs and the rest of Mr. Steward's class will have a featured article in the upcoming edition of the DNR Natural Resources Magazine highlighting our project of capturing and removing the invasive Rusty Crayfish from the Yellow River.





Family and Consumer Science classes have been very busy this term! Students in the Gourmet Foods course have learned many different techniques within the classroom - ranging from knife cuts, yeast fermentation labs, and working with 1st graders to bake and decorate cupcakes. They have also participated in culinary network activities such as: cupcake wars, food truck wars, and CHOPPED competitions. The 7th grade EXPO class helped plant the school garden and will be able to harvest that produce in the fall of 2017.

#### Classic/World Literature Explores Asia

The most memorable classes are those in which students can actively participate. In Ms. Freedlund's Classic/World Literature, students have been exploring England, India, Afghanistan, Pakistan, Japan, and China. Along the way, students have learned the basic demographics from each country, who the major authors are, watched a film from the region, and either eaten some food from the country or participated in an activity. Individually, each student must read at least one book from another country and do an On-Going Book Report that focuses on the similarities and differences between our culture and the culture depicted in the book.

Students have tasted curry and naan from India, practiced their origami skills, and painted their names in one of the Japanese styles. After watching a Bollywood film, *Bride and Prejudice*, we truly understand the importance of "No life, without wife". The class has also enjoyed *Young Victoria*, *The Kite Runner*, *and Spirited Away*. Classic/World Literature is offered every other year.



The students in grades 3-8 participated in the Forward Exam this spring. When the results become public, you will receive your child's individual results. Great work to all the students!



#### 1st Grade News

Our 1st grade classes went to the high school to learn how to bake cupcakes with Mrs. Anderson's Foods Class. Our students learned the step-by-step process of cupcake making and got to help with pouring, mixing, frosting, and eating!!! We then came back to our classrooms and wrote a "How To" book about making cupcakes using transition words such as...First, Second, Next, Finally, etc. After our books were finished, the high school students visited our classrooms and the 1st graders read their <a href="How to Make Cupcakes">How to Make Cupcakes</a> books with them. It was a fun and educational experience for our students!





### JH Mathematics Competition

On April 28, Pittsville hosted the 2017 Junior High Mathematics Competition. This year, seven schools participated with 13 teams and a total of 52 students. Students completed five different tests. The tests included Fractions, Decimals, and Percents; Algebra; Geometry; Problem Solving; and Team Problem Solving. All tests, but the last one, were done without a calculator and students had 15 minutes per test. Unfortunately, we didn't place in the top three teams, but Emily Carlson from 8th grade tied for 5th place out of the top 12 individuals.

#### College for Kids

On April 7, five sixth grade students and Mr. Schultz went to College Days for Kids at UWSP. The program is designed for sixth graders to take enrichment classes taught by university staff. Natalie Fuller, Marcus Getsinger, Madeline Hensel, Emma Kurtzweil, and Anna Pozayt attended, and each student was able to take three classes throughout the day. They were able to participate in classes such as Chemistry Magic, Stopping Lymes Disease, Bad Astronomy, and The Stargazer. Every year, UWSP holds this event via three sessions in April. Each session has an average of 300 students from area schools that attend. Since the program began in 1985, over 13,000 sixth grade students have participated in this simulated college experience, which can later promote students to attend college.



#### Visioneer Design Challenge 2017 - Power of Relationships: Personal, Social, and Cultural

Twenty-one students participated in the Visioneer Design Challenge on April 21. The group headed down the day before to participate in a Milwaukee Art Museum tour and workshop. Many students also elected to explore Discovery World where there are many active STEM activities.

Isis Ignatowski and Autumn Czrniejewski created a picture book, *Patches*. Along with their book, they sewed a stuffed cat named Patches. The illustrator enjoyed their story line and the sewed cat, placing them first. A UW- Milwaukee professor felt the book should go to publication. The onsite challenge placed first for Autumn and second for Isis.

Laney Garrels participated in a new challenge this year – Toy Design. To begin her long-term challenge, she received a box on toy pieces to experiment new designs. During her on-site challenge, they continued to explore solutions for the design. Laney took first on her long-term and on-site challenges.

Sarah Downs and Hanna Tarazi-Baron created a selection of digital photos that were documentary in nature on Decreasing Biodiversity. With 60 participants in digital photography, they took second on their long-term and on-site challenges.

Lexi Schraufnagel participated in Graphic Design creating a t-shirt and poster. She placed first on her long-term challenge. For the on-site challenge, she had two separate challenges where she took a first place for a billboard design and third place for her shirt design.

Emily Carlson, Rebekah Downs and Maria Esser created a community center for the Pittsville Area. Their architectural design was an outstanding design of details taking first for the long-term and on-site challenges. They would be great members on a committee to improve our city.

Two groups participated in the Gaming Challenge – Trace Wilke and Dryden Luther; Ethan Hanutke and Asher Fiala. Trace and Dryden created a card game while designing their own characters for the game, taking second on the long-term challenge. Ethan and Asher placed first of their long-term challenge and second for overall on the on-site challenge. Their board game, The Cursed Key, consisted of Lego keys and games pieces made with a 3-D printer.

Ruth Durrant and Caitlyn Fox took on the Graphic Design challenge, placing first for the long-term and on-site challenges. They marketed their Pick-Me-Up Postcard Project were students can get a postcard to fill out for another student to bring up their spirits. They also incorporated the elderly by having them color the postcards.

Ainsley Hall and Ellie Macha went beyond their Solutions Challenge tackling the refugee issue. They created a campaign to help refugees, especially women and children. They did not restrict their selves to one social media; they covered it all by creating a website with links, Facebook page, posters, and an Entry Village. Without trouble, they took first for the long-term and on-site challenges. In fact, they would like to link their project on the Wisconsin Art Education Association (WAEA) website as an example for the Visioneer Design Challenge.

Maddy Hensel and Emma Kurtzweil charmed their judge with their well-organized presentation for their Pretzel's Paradise Exhibit Design, placing first for their long-term challenge. They created the interactive zoo themed exhibit, as you would see at a trade show, as well as a presentation board explaining their process.

Delaney Klamrowski and Kelly Behselich dove deep into three psychographics: Personal, Social and Cultural to reach their customer with their t-shirts designs. They placed first on their long-term challenge and second on their on-site challenge.













#### 5th Graders' Inquiring Minds

On March 28, the 5th grade English Language Arts classes hosted an Inquiry Fair to celebrate their learning. As part of our Non-Fiction Unit of Study for Reading, the 5th grade students chose a topic to research. After completing their research, they wrote a five paragraph essay on the topic. They all became experts in their topic and condensed the information from their papers into an interactive presentation. The 5th grade students were excited to teach others about their topics. It was wonderful to see the students teaching their peers, parents, and other teachers about a topic that they were passionate about. We had an amazing turnout for the event. Fifth grade parents enjoyed being part of their child's learning experience and browsing the different stations. The second, third, and sixth grade students also toured the Inquiry Fair and listened to presentations while participating in interactive activities. It was an exciting way to celebrate the 5th graders learning and they were happy to share what they learned.
