SKYLERT/SCHOOL MESSENGER NOTIFICATION

School Messenger allows the district to quickly send mass notifications to parents and students. The system is used to notify families of emergency situations, weather related delays, cancellations, attendance, lunch balances, changes to athletic and other events, and general information about up-coming events. Through Family Access, a parent/guardian can set up the capability to receive these messages, including what types they would like to receive, and what phone numbers or e-mail addresses to use. To check and update your Skylert contact information, log into your Family Access Account in Skyward. Click on the Skylert option listed on the left hand side. Click Edit to make changes to the information or to change your preference of notification delivery. SENIORS:

Please continue to work on **scholarships** and stay tuned for the local scholarships which will be posted by the end of January. Most local scholarships are due Wednesday, April 4th, but some are due <u>sooner</u>. For more information, check out the Scholarship Tab under High School Counseling on the PHS Home page. Also, please remember to complete your **FAFSA** before the priority date for your college. Applications have been available online since October 1, 2017 at: http://www.fafsa.ed.gov/ (There is also a link off the HS Counseling website.)

As the acceptance letters start to roll in, remember to celebrate! Your hard work has paid off and the next chapter is beginning. Please notify the counseling office of your final decision for life after high school. If you have not been accepted and are waitlisted, please also seek out the counseling office to help answer any questions you may have or any documents you may need to provide.

JUNIORS:

If you are planning to **register for the ACT** this spring, please make sure you register online before the registration date ends to avoid paying a late fee. Students can register online at www.actstudent.org. (There is also a link off the HS Counseling website under the "Testing" tab.) Spring test dates include:

- a. Test Date: February 10, 2018—Registration Deadline January 12, 2018
- b. Test Date: April 14, 2018—Registration Deadline: March 9, 2018
- c. Test Date: June 9, 2018—Registration Deadline: May 4, 2018
- d. NEW: Test Date: July 12, 2018-Registration Deadline: June 15, 2018

On January 22, all juniors will be taking a practice ACT at school in the morning. This is just one way the juniors are being introduced to the upcoming state required ACT, which will be offered at school on February 27, 2018. Please make every effort to be at school on this day so as to avoid unnecessary stress on yourself. This test can be used for college & technical school entrance. Students will indicate their four post-secondary choices prior to the day of the test. On February 28, students will take the required ACT Work Keys, which is an employability skills test. If students miss one or both of the required test dates, make up is mandatory the mornings of March 20 & 21, 2018.

SOPHOMORE, FRESHMEN, and 8TH GRADE:

As we head into the registration for next year, please make sure you are taking time to plan out your courses based on what is best for your future. To assist in this process, sophomores & 8th graders should attend "Your Future is Now Night" on January 31st at 6:00 pm at the high school. This evening is designed for students to look ahead to their beginning and final years of high school and taking the proper classes that will help them achieve success. The students of those parents that attend the event will be allowed to register first in their upcoming registration day later that month. In addition to this, during 3rd and 4th term, freshmen and sophomore individual planning conferences will be held to discuss current high school goals and future plans. During these meetings, students are also encouraged to look for ways to volunteer in their free time and over the summer to begin building a strong scholarship résumé. Students are reminded to continue their career and post-secondary exploration and planning by using their Career Cruising accounts.

6TH GRADE

- How difficult is college?

- Do you have to pass tests to get your degree or certification?
- How expensive would it be to begin a business?
- How long would I have to go to college?

7TH GRADE

- How do I set up a bank account and balance a checkbook?
- How much money can I really expect to make at the job I want?
- What are some good jobs I can get right out of high school?
- How much does housing cost while I attend college?
- Should I go for an Associates or Bachelor's degree?
- What classes are related to the career I want?
- How quickly do you go through lessons in college?
- What are the advantages of small schools?

8TH GRADE

- What are skills, other than academic, that would help me get the job?
- Can I take a virtual tour of colleges/technical colleges?
- Where do I go and how do I go about finding the job I know I want?
- How do I budget, pay medical bills, get housing, get a vehicle, use insurance, etc.?

PHS News



As always, Term 3 is a very busy time at PHS: Final Exams for Term 2 are coming soon, we have begun the process of getting students registered for next year's classes, and we are putting extra effort into preparing for state testing.

Term 2 Final Exams will be January 18th, so I thought I would share a few tips to help prepare for them. From an academic standpoint, students would do well to spend a little time each day reviewing some of the material that they worked on for the previous nine weeks. It makes things much easier to remember come test-time! From a physical standpoint, rest and healthy eating are essential to doing one's best on any exams.

For parents of eighth and tenth grade students, there is an important date to put on your calendars. Our "Your Future is Now Night" will be January 31st. Eighth grade students will get an introduction to life at the high school, meet their advisors, and get more information about classes and scheduling (see the next paragraph) for next year. Tenth grade students will hear presentations and be able to meet with representatives of the UW system, the Technical Colleges, and the Military. This is an evening that is filled with a wealth of important information for PHS families, so I highly recommend your attendance. As an incentive, students whose parents attend will be in the first group to register for classes!

Eighth through eleventh grade students will be registering for classes for the 2018-2019 school year during the week of February 12th. They will begin meeting with their advisors on January 5th to start putting together schedules for their remaining years at the high school, and specifically for next year. Parents will see registration materials coming home soon. Please take the time to look through them, as well as the high school course handbook and the master schedules (on the PHS website) when helping your students plan which classes to take. Your advice will be very helpful in setting them up for success after they leave here. It is never to soon start planning for life after high school!

Finally, the ACT exams will be held on February 28th for all Juniors. Make-up for this mandatory state test will be later in March, so it is essential that your child be here for this important assessment. The ACT will determine which technical college programs they are eligible to enroll in, and which universities will accept them. We will be preparing the students for the exam through many activities during January and February, including a pre-ACT test on January 23rd. Your support of these activities will go a long way toward helping your child achieve at their highest level on the ACT.

Again, this is a very busy and important time for the students at PHS. Please talk to your children about these important events. They will welcome your wise input (and you might be amazed at their insights into their own futures)!



On February 13th, the Pittsville Career & Technical Education (CTE) Departments will be hosting the second annual CTE night from 5pm-8pm in the Pittsville School District lobby. The Agriculture, Family Consumer Sciences, Business, and Technology Education Teachers as well as the High School Counselor will have booths showcasing their perspective departments. PHS Competes at Math League

On November 8, thirteen Pittsville high school students traveled to the University of Wisconsin Stevens Point to participate in the first meet for the High School Math League Competition. The competition has three categories: Algebra, Geometry, and Advanced Math. Fifty different schools brought their top math students to compete in the competition. Pittsville beat nineteen schools, four from School Size 2.

The four students who represented Pittsville School District in the Geometry category were Evan Dammann, Greg Hoffman, Ethan Hanutke, and Morgan Geer. Trayson Ortner, Hunter Wilke, Drew Bratlie, and Ryan Zickert took the challenging Algebra 2 test. The four students competing in the Advanced Math category were Trevor Winterhack, Luke Denniston, Tyler Carlson, and Lydia Sanken. All students worked hard and scored points for their team. In school size three, there were 52 students taking each test. The Geometry students fared well with three students placing in the top half. Emily Carlson competed as an alternate in Geometry and scored the highest on the test. However, alternates cannot place so she will have to wait until the second test to earn a top spot. Evan placed 18th, Cody placed 24th, and Ethan placed 26th out of 52. In the Algebra category, Trayson placed 13th and he was the only Pittsville student to place in the top half. The Advanced category was a challenging test for Pittsville with Trevor Winterhack in 15th place followed by Luke Denniston in 26th place. The next competition is January 24th and the final competition is March 21st.

Congratulations to all participants! Good luck on January 24th.

PBIS Rewards (Part 2 of 4 in the Series)

Offering rewards to our students is an important component of PBIS. Our school strives to go beyond just teaching expected behaviors, but also finding ways to recognize and reward students for engaging in appropriate behavior. Research shows that recognizing students for showing appropriate behavior is even more important than catching students making bad choices. A goal of our PBIS system is to increase the number of positive interactions that all school staff have with students. All staff members are asked to give out "Golden Tickets" when they observe students exhibiting our Panther Traits and going above and beyond expectations. Teachers have a menu of rewards posted in their classrooms that students can choose from when deciding to redeem their earned tickets. The office also has rewards available where students can spend their tickets. The rewards vary greatly and include material things like small candy treats or toys, extra privileges such as being the line leader or the assistant principal, or group rewards like a dance party or game time. Students are also given a "Platinum Ticket," equal to five "Golden Tickets," for every quarter that they do not receive a behavior documentation form. The reward component of PBIS helps ensure students are acknowledged for making great choices and the number of positive interactions at school increases.

Writing is Wonderful

One of the skill areas the second graders in Mrs. Denniston's class have been working on is paragraph writing. They've been focusing on including all the necessary components, along with trying to use more detailed or clearer language to improve their writing pieces. Most recently, they finished a descriptive paragraph combined with a craft project telling what would make the Grinch grin, and an informational paragraph on grassland animals where they tied in technology skills like word processing and cutting and pasting images. The second graders' writing skills are steadily improving!

Currently in the **Fourth Grade Writing Class**, students are honing their skills in debate writing and are getting a preview of creating personal narratives. They are starting with a story about an experience they had over Christmas Break.

In the **Fifth Grade Writing Class**, students are honing their skills in opinion writing and continuing their personal narrative writing. They too will be starting the New Year by writing about experiences they had over Christmas Break.





Third Graders have been busy working on writing research papers as part of the Lucy Caulkins Reading and Writing Workshop curriculum. The students worked in research groups to learn more about animals and develop subtopics about their animals' habitats, body, predators, etc. The groups of animals that the students learned about were: giraffes, bears, cheetahs, dolphins, and whales. The students learned about important text features in an informational text including: table of contents, captions, glossary, the idea of comparing and contrasting, and fact/opinion. Students learned how to research using different informational texts and searching the internet on www.nationalgeographickids.com, www.kidrex.org and www.pebblego.com for information to use in their research papers. They have worked hard on synthesizing their information from different resources together to develop their papers. Students worked on creating chapters for their papers based on what they thought a reader needed to know about their animals. They have worked very hard on researching and becoming informational writers. Great job third graders!



1st Grade News - Nonfiction Focus in First Grade ~ from Mrs. Moore and Mrs. Stone

We studied nonfiction text and nonfiction text features in second quarter. We have used what we learned to write an "All About" animal research book. Each student researched an animal of their choice. They had to use at least two sources, books and online information. The students wrote chapters, made diagrams, and summarized the information about their animal. Additionally, they created a table of contents. Finally, the first grade classes published the reports and shared them with their peers.

LOW LUNCH BALANCES

Accounts below \$25.00 will be notified weekly through the Pittsville School District's SchoolMessenger alert system. The notice explains that your family food service funds are running low and money should be added as soon as possible.

If a family account gets below zero, a notice will be sent out stating if the amount due is not paid in three working days, your children will no longer be able to participate in the breakfast and/or lunch program. If no money is received, a note will go home explaining the account is closed and Pittsville Schools will no longer be providing breakfast, lunch, or milk. It is then the parent's responsibility to provide their child with a lunch from home. Once money is added, your children may again participate in the school's food service programs.

Here are a few tips to insure your family food service account is up-to-date and in good standing.

- Check with your answering machines and email to see if your family received an alert message concerning a low lunch balance.
- If you received a notice, please send payment as soon as possible.
- When sending in a payment, please include your family name and amount sent.

ONLINE PAYMENTS ARE EASY AND CONVIENENT

Parents can make online payments from home or work, 24/7. If their child's food service balance is low, it only takes a few minutes to add money to it using their VISA or MasterCard credit or debit card (NOTE: your credit card will be charged \$2.50 for the convenience of making an online payment). Payments are made through the student's Skyward Family Access account.

- Log in to Skyward Family Access (you will need your Login and Password)
- Select "Food Service" from "General Information" menu on the left
- View Balance and select "Make Online Payment"

- Verify payment amount and select "Go to Checkout"
- If a new customer, select "I am a new customer" and enter your email address. If a returning customer select "I am a returning customer."

The free or reduced lunch program not only benefits families but it also helps your school. Your application is completely confidential. If you did not receive a copy in the mail, the applications are available online at www.pittsville.k12. wi.us and in your school offices.

BREAKFAST PROGRAM

The High School will serve breakfast during PPT time and the students will take the food items to their next class. The **Elementary School** will be serving breakfast at 8:00 am. Students that would like breakfast will first report to their classrooms, and then come down to the cafeteria for breakfast. Grades 4Kgn-3rd will be issued a breakfast card in the classroom to be turned in at the breakfast line. Grades 4th-8th will punch in their lunch numbers before going through the lines. School breakfast is an ideal solution on busy mornings when students are running late or parents have to be at work The cost is only \$1.00. Students that qualify for free or reduced lunch receive free breakfast.

1977-78: Boys Basketball - The boys' basketball squad finished with a 13-10 record. The boys, coached by Noel Denniston and ably assisted by Charles Soper, were led by seniors Dean Barten, Paul Yetter, Ed Hendrickson, Pete Yetter, Dan Zeman and standout underclassman Dave Elwood. The highlight of the season is when the team won a Regional Championship. Girls Basketball - The girls' basketball team was coached by Vicky Dankemeyer and led by seniors Cheryl Roder and Peg Krueger. Wrestling - Coach Jerry Hahn led a talented squad for the '78 campaign. Seniors Mike Nordman, Ed Bowden, Dan Dexter, Rick Schwanebeck and Dan Hahn provided leadership for the team. Dan Hahn and Ed Bowden were Marawood Conference champions. Four members of the team qualified for sectionals including John Nordman, Joe Buelt, Dexter and Hahn. Dan Hahn then went on to win sectionals and became the third person from Pittsville to qualify for the State tournament.

1987-88: Boys Basketball - Head Coach Noel Denniston's young '88 squad was led by seniors Paul Baker and Alan Frost who led the team to a 14-6 overall record. Girls Basketball - The 1988, team was one of the finest teams fielded by Head Coach Don Neve. The seniors included Debbie Neve, Beth Martin, Liane Brown, Chris Fossen, Julie Schultz, Donna Drechsler and Kari LaSee. The girls had a great season and went on the win a Class C Regional Championship and qualify for Sectionals. Wrestling - Coached by Gerry Hahn and Mike Brogan. Sectional qualifiers: 103- Rob Schooley, 125- Paul Grossman, 135- Jeremy Klevene, 145- Brad Marten. 2nd place sectional qualifiers were 119- Jeremiah Quimby, 152- Brandon Dammann, HWT- Jeremy Duerr. State qualifiers were 135- Jeremy Klevene, 171-Brad Marten.

2007-08 Boys Basketball - On the boy's side, the team was led by head coach Dan Hoffa and assisted by Shane Lilly. Seniors on the team were Zach Copeland, Josh Sherwood, Chase O'Keefe, and Jesse Sojka, All Conference Honorable Mention were Sherwood and Copeland. Wrestling - The goal of achieving a Conference title by getting past Edgar was achieved this season. A 22-7 season record was excellent, but the team just missed a trip to the team tournament losing in the Regionals to Edgar by 3 team points.
