MESSAGE FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

Pittsville is pleased to be able to say the district was open for on-site learning the entire year and offered almost all of the extracurricular and athletic activities normally offered. The staff has worked harder to educate our kids than any previous year and deserves a sincere pat on the back and thanks from everyone in our community. One of the most valuable resources we have is time and we did our best to use it to our students' advantage. Many parents grew a deeper appreciation of the work educators do for our kids during the last year and a quarter.



The Career and Technical Education Center remains on schedule to open this coming fall. We are excited to begin educating our students in this modern, state of the art facility within our nationally recognized CTE program and Academy. Public tours will be available in mid to late August for parents and community members. Keller Construction has been a strong partner in the process and optimized several of the systems to keep the quality high and stay within our budget. Initial work on the Elementary School Primary Wing roof will begin the first week in June and is expected to be completed by the start of school next fall.

Beginning in summer school, face covering requirements will be:

Face coverings required:

ANNUAL NOTICE OF SPECIAL EDUCATION REFERRAL AND EVALUATION PROCEDURES

Upon request, the School District of Pittsville is required to evaluate a child for eligibility for special education services. A request for evaluation is known as a referral. When the district receives a referral, the district will appoint an Individualized Education Program (IEP) team to determine if the child has a disability, and if the child needs special education services. The district locates, identifies, and evaluates all children with disabilities who are enrolled by their parents in private (including religious) schools, elementary schools and secondary schools located in the school district.

A physician, nurse, psychologist, social worker, or administrator of a social agency who reasonably believes a child brought to him or her for services is a child with a disability has a legal duty to refer the child, including a homeless child, to the school district in which the child resides. Before referring the child, the person making the referral must inform the child's parent that the referral will be made.

Others, including parents, who reasonably believe a child is a child with a disability, may also refer the child, including a homeless child, to the school district in which the child resides.

Referrals must be in writing and include the reason why the person believes the child is a child with a disability. COVD-19 INFORMATION

COVID-19: Resources for Parents and Guardians

Did you know?

- Children can get sick with COVID-19 and can spread it to others, even if they do not have symptoms.
- Many children who get COVID-19 have mild symptoms or have no symptoms at all.
 However, some children do get very sick.
- Medical experts are still learning about the long-term effects of COVID-19 in children.
- One rare but serious condition associated with COVID-19, multisystem inflammatory syndrome in children (MIS-C), is being closely investigated.

Children at higher risk for severe illness from COVID-19

- Babies under 1 year old might be more likely to have severe illness from COVID-19.
- Other children, regardless of age, with <u>underlying medical</u> <u>conditions</u> might also be at increased risk of severe illness compared to other children.

If your child has an underlying condition, make sure to discuss your child's risk for getting very sick with their <u>health care provider</u> and take steps to protect your child from COVID-19.

Routine preventative care is important for children of all ages

- Even though children younger than 12 years cannot get the COVID-19 vaccine right now, make sure they are up-to-date on <u>vaccines that protect them</u> from many other diseases.
- · Be sure to schedule routine childhood health care visits
 - $\circ\,$ These visits help prevent other conditions and illnesses and ensure your child is healthy.
 - At a routine childhood health care visit, your child may receive childhood vaccines, weight and height check-ups, nutrition counselling, anemia and lead testing, support for language development and more.

Stop the Spread of COVID-19 in Children

Follow these steps as much as you are able to prevent the spread of COVID-19:

- Encourage your child to <u>cover their coughs and sneezes</u>. Show your child how to cover their mouth and nose with a tissue or the inside of their elbow.
- Help your child wear a mask when in public and around people they don't live with if they are 2 or more years old.
- Make sure your child washes their hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds or that they use hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol.
- Keep your child at least 6 feet away from others who don't live with them and those who are sick.
- Get your child tested if they have symptoms of COVID-19 or if they come in close contact with someone who has COVID-19.
- Keep your child home if they are <u>sick or</u> if they have been in <u>close</u> contact with someone with <u>COVID-19</u>.
- Get your child vaccinated when they are eligible. By being vaccinated, they have a far lower risk of getting severely sick, being hospitalized, or dying from COVID-19.
 - Currently, if your child is 12 years or older, they are eligible to receive the Pfizer vaccine. The Moderna and Johnson & Johnson vaccines are authorized for use in people ages 18 and older.
- As a parent, get vaccinated. All adults in Wisconsin are eligible to receive a COVID-19 vaccine. You can help protect your child by getting vaccinated.





High School Principal's Message



The end of another school year brings many emotions; the promise and hope of new beginnings being one of them. The Class of 2021 is ready to start the next chapter in the book of their lives. They have their roadmaps for what is next firmly in their reach; they have been carried through their formative years by the Pittsville family who has loved, cared for and nurtured them. The Class of 2022 is ready to take that final step into their last year of high school. The 8th grade is ready for high school! Ask any of the staff and parents who are with the students each day; you can literally *feel* how ready they are by the suppressed energy that fills the halls.

We are all hoping for a different summer, and a different school year than the one that has been our reality. Yet, let us acknowledge the blossomed resilience and perseverance of these students and staff, in spite of events - together - we all got the job done. We learned how to find another way to think about teaching and learning, and amazing teaching and learning is emerging because of the obstacles that were placed in front of us.. We found resources, became resourceful, built capacity in one another, and learned to share our collective learning with each other. Our students found other ways to make their time meaningful when the school day had to look different. They earned certifications, got jobs, and learned how to be a little more self-reliant and responsible.

While it is important to remember where we have been and the lessons we have learned, it is important also to look ahead and keep our eyes focused on the future and where we are headed; as Mary Engelbreit said, "Don't look back, you're not going that way."



BIOLOGY

For the 11th year, Mr. Steward's 10th grade Biology students conducted a Rusty Crayfish Trapping lab in the Yellow River. The goal of the lab is to calculate the numbers of invasive Rusty Crayfish that are present in the Yellow River. This year 649 males and 56 females were caught totaling 705 Rusty Crayfish removed from the section of the Yellow River that passes on the west side of the city of Pittsville and Pittsville High School.

Students placed 9 traps in the river at different depths, in different substrates and using different baits. Every Monday, Wednesday and Friday the traps were checked and water temperature measured. Each crayfish caught are sexed, measured and stored in plastic bags. The crayfish are frozen and will be transported to area wildlife centers for animal consumption.

This is an excellent opportunity for students to learn firsthand in a real world setting the scientific method, utilizing proper lab procedures and how to write a scientific lab report. Cold temperatures and cold water made the lab challenging, but the students were very energetic throughout the monthlong lab. Overall, the Rusty Crayfish Trapping lab and lessons learned by the students was a tremendous success.

ENGLISH 11/12 ~Ms. Jones

Students in the English 11/12 class recently collaborated with the Pittsville Area Business Association on a community-based project. Students took the challenge of contacting Pittsville area businesses and offering to write a spotlight article about the business for the Pittsville Record. Students practiced listening, speaking, and writing skills as they contacted the businesses, drafted the interview questions, conducted phone or virtual interviews, and then wrote and revised the articles. Students were creative, professional, and extremely supportive of each other throughout the interview and writing processes. The class submitted a total of 24 articles to the Pittsville Record for publication, and they can't wait to see their work in print!

Technology Education 2020-21

The 2020-21 school year was full of hands-on, project based learning from the technology education department. A few highlights from this year include: new technology and machinery for students to utilize, two "Open for Business" signs collaborated with the Pittsville Business Group, new shop stools designed and fabricated by welding students, shed remodel and chicken coop project constructed by building and construction students, and many new work based learning opportunities developed through new business partnerships. As we prepare to move into the new Career and Technical Education (CTE) Facility, we can't wait to see what is in store for the 2021-22 school year.









FAMILY AND CONSUMER SCIENCE ~Mrs. Anderson

The Family and Consumer Sciences department has had an excellent year and have been focusing on branching out to deliver great experiences to our students! The Gourmet Foods class were able to demonstrate skills learned in class by completing hands-on labs. The students were able to complete foraging identification and then went to the school forest to harvest wood violets. The students prepped and made violet syrup, learning about adding an acid and alkaline base to see how the violet syrup changed color.









HISTORY OF WISCONSIN

The trip was hosted by Tom and Tammy Hardinger, along with their son Will (also a member of the class). This trip was a great opportunity for the students to get some insight on the maple syrup industry.



MUSIC MADNESS EN ESPAÑOL

All levels of Spanish just wrapped up novels. Spanish 1 students read Piratas del Caribe by Mira Canion. They enjoyed dressing up and acting out the fight scenes. Spanish 2 students read Robo en la noche by Kristy Placido. They learned about Costa Rica, cooked a traditional Costa Rican breakfast of gallo pinto(rice and beans), eggs, and fresh tropical fruits. Spanish 3/4/5 read 48 horas by Carrie Toth. They learned about the harsh ecosystems on the Galapagos Islands. Being stranded on an island there could be a matter of life and death as they learned in the novel.

Wisconsin is the 4th biggest producer of maple syrup in the United States, topped only by Vermont, Maine, and New York. The purpose of the trip was to demonstrate the process of making maple syrup, which starts with tapping the trees, cooking the sap down in the Hardinger's custom made evaporator, and then bottling the finished product. It takes about 40 gallons of sap to get one gallon of syrup and the evaporator boils off between 60 to 80 gallons of sap an hour. The Hardinger's have produced around 100 gallons of syrup this year, which was a slow year for them. Normally they are producing around 150 to 200 gallons of syrup in an average year.

They bottle up around 40 gallons of syrup in pints, quarts, and half gallons to sell to local customers and the remainder of the syrup is put into 15 gallon drums and sold to larger producers.

Our hosts ended the field trip by graciously providing a delicious treat of ice cream topped with fresh maple syrup!

MATH IN MOTION ~ Mrs. Downs

The new math class this past term was titled *Math in Motion* and students have been busy learning about motion, calculating displacement, velocity and acceleration as well as building things that move.

While some understanding of Algebra 2 and the use of your calculator have been useful, it hasn't all been that 'fast paced'. Students have also had paper airplane competitions and discovered the meaning of displacement. They have followed directions and built their own Delta Darts as well as done some problem solving to get them to glide like hawks. Collecting supplies and a basic set of plans they have constructed mouse trip cars which came with no sparing of problem solving and finally projectile motion has brought them to designing their own catapult in order to collect measurements and determine a marshmallows initial velocity. They hope to accomplish one last project this week, ROCKETS!! What a blast we have had learning about motion and discovering it hands on too.

According to a Reading Rockets article called <u>What Parents Can Do: Reading Tips from Kids</u>. Parents can do the following to make reading more motivating for their children...

- 1. Let kids pick out their own books. Having a choice in what kids read is a powerful tool in getting them motivated to read! Make trips to bookstores, libraries or mini free community roadside libraries a frequent habit.
- 2. **Set goals and reward reading**. Some goals might be: Try to spend a certain amount of time reading before bed every night, read one or two chapters a night, make a treat when goals are met.
- 3. Let your kids see YOU read frequently. Read for enjoyment, not just for information. Do you have a book next to your bed or chair? Do you grab a newspaper or magazine when you have a break?
- 4. **Make reading fun!** I loved it when my mom would read in humorous character voices or acted out scenes from the stories.
- 5. **Create loving associations with books and reading.** Do you snuggle up with your child while you read? Is the house peaceful and quiet during reading time? Do you write loving notes to your child or talk about books that you have both read?

a home or business in Pittsville and where it goes to get processed. Peter told the students that only the 3 "P's" should be put into a toilet, not disposable wipes.

Seventh Graders have been studying organisms in the different kingdoms. As they had just completed the fungi kingdom, Mr. Matthew McDaniel, a local resident and father to Autumn, a student in the class, came and shared information about local mushrooms. He enlightened the class with what he picks, when and where he finds them and even how to prepare them.

What can I do this summer? Volunteer, Volunteer!

One of the most common questions I hear from both students and parents is, "How can I (or my student) win scholarships my (his/her) senior year?" My answer very simply is volunteer, volunteer, volunteer! Most scholarship committees follow the "ACE rule" (Academic Excellence, Community Service, and Extra Curricular Involvement) when selecting their recipients. As I tell students, in this current day and age, it is not enough to simply get good grades and be involved in a few clubs and/or sports. While those aspects are certainly good and looked upon favorably, what tends to set the winners of multiple scholarships apart from those who only receive one or two is the amount of "genuine" community service they have done over the course of their high school career. To be counted as high school community service, students can start volunteering as early as the summer before their freshmen year. Community service can typically be any service done for another person (non-relative) or agency that is not compensated monetarily or by other means. A great place to start at when looking for places to volunteer is the United Way of Inner Wisconsin which looks to match volunteers with local places/events in need of help; for more information visit their website at www.uwiw.org and click on volunteer. Important Reminders for the Class of 2021

- 1. Request your final transcripts through Parchment: All students attending a post-secondary institution will need to submit their final transcripts through Parchment, our online transcript service. (Please see the link off the high school home page to get started with this process.) Please remember to do this sooner than later as your acceptance to your school is still considered "conditional" until they receive your final high school transcripts.
- 2. Complete your FAFSA ASAP: If you have not already done so, please complete your FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) as soon as possible so you are eligible for more aid. Your 2019 taxes should be completed before you apply for the most accurate information. Applications are available online at: http://www.fafsa.ed.gov/
- 3. *UW Placement Tests Registration: NEW* Seniors attending a UW next fall are typically asked to take placement tests to determine what classes they should be placed in. Placement tests are currently suspended, please check here for updates: https://exams.wisc.edu/placement/regionaltesting/information.php. Each UW institution will be handling freshmen course placement on an individual basis.

Dear Families of the Pittsville School District.

Pittsville School District will be hosting summer school June 7 through July 15, Monday through Thursday each of these weeks. Our food service department will sponsor a summer food service



The season was a great success due to excellent coaching and the leadership of the seniors. Track: The 1981 track season sure was one for the record books!
