FROM THE DESK OF THE DISTRICT ADMINISTRATOR

Dear Parents and Community Members,

Our new roof over the Primary wing has been completed and the 24,000 square foot CTE facility is being used to educate our students!

We are pleased to have all of our classes and programs running this school year in spite of the challenges presented through the COVID-19 pandemic. We are offering all of the regular and extracurricular programing that was available prior to the pandemic with the main differences being masking for visitors at indoor events. Pittsville is making decisions based on our school data and is leading our state using the "Test to Stay" program briefly described below. Several area districts will begin similar programs in the near future using our data and successful procedures.

The District implemented a voluntary "Test to Stay" (TTS) program about 4 weeks ago. The TTS program gives non-symptomatic, non-household, close contacts the option to do a rapid COVID-19 screen each morning before school and stay in school, verses quarantine out of school; as long as the test is negative and they do not develop symptoms. Currently in the TTS program, staff and students test for 7 school days after exposure to the positive case and are required to wear a face covering through day 14 after exposure.

This is a pilot program being done in cooperation with Wood County Health Department. We review data weekly and will make adjustments to be able to keep more children in school after they are exposed to a positive COVID-19 case. Parents complete a registration and permission form prior to testing and results are reported to the parents. The TTS program also has the capacity to do the PCR test which is sent out to a lab. We do PCR testing when a rapid test reads positive or a student or staff member becomes symptomatic. NOAH Labs will be taking over PCR testing as of November 1, 2021 with the intention of speeding up return on test results from the previous lab. The state has provided the funding associated with the TTS program.

Our COVID-19 Dashboard is kept up daily on our website at www.pittsville.k12.wi.us, and we have seen a significant drop in the number of positives and quarantined close contacts in the last 2 weeks. The full TTS Guidelines are available on this page. We are discussing the data as it relates to household close contacts in quarantine because at this time TTS is not available for them unless they are vaccinated and have isolated from the positive in their household. Being aware of the health of your children and household members is a very important part of keeping more students in school and fewer people possibly exposed to COVID-19.

The Wood County Health Department is offering a free walk in vaccination clinic at the Elementary School Cafeteria from 3:30 – 5:30 p.m. on Wednesday, November 10. They will also vaccinate eligible children and provide booster shots for those eligible for a booster. This is a voluntary option and the Board of Education is not requiring vaccination of students and staff.



Please read the other articles in this newsletter. Our schools have many wonderful opportunities and experiences to share, like: the high school Juniors all completed a fall ACT, Splash of Red Cranberry Tours being a huge success again this year, our 7th grade students taking on the building of an outdoor classroom, the Harlem Wizards will be here on May 5, 2022 for a school fundraiser, many grade level reports, the summer free meals program for all of our student to eat breakfast and lunch free of charge will continue through the school year, and of course some great pictures of our kids in their school!.

HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

One quarter of the school year at PHS is done already! It's been an interesting experience already. Here are some major highlights from the first part of the year.

Homecoming was a great success! We had a week of decorations, contests, a hard fought football game, and a dance attended by nearly 100 students. It was great to be able to safely celebrate the high school experience during a pandemic. Kudos to the students and staff who made this week happen!

All the juniors at PHS took the ACT on 10/19/2021. This was done to familiarize students with the rigorous exam before the real deal in March. A good ACT score can open up some important doors for students. We hope to prepare them to do their best by letting them take the entire exam, learning how to pace themselves and reflecting on what they need to master before the official test. Students will get their scores from this attempt in about six weeks.

Cranberry Tours were a great success again. Ms. Meissner, Miss Tyler (PHS Agriculture Student Teacher) and their students worked very hard to provide a great experience for our community and teach about the importance of the cranberry industry to the area. It was a lot of work, but it went off without a hitch and our students did a great job!

COVID-19 came back, unfortunately. We had briefly hoped that we would not have to consider COVID mitigations when we were planning for the school year in the summer, but the virus had other plans. The community numbers rose from late October on and many students had to miss school time as they either came down with the virus or were close contacts. Fortunately, none of our students got seriously ill and all are either back in school or nearly so. With the implementation of the Test-to-Stay program, we have a path for keeping our students in school if they come into contact with someone who has COVID-19. Students merely need to take a rapid test each morning for eight days and wear a mask for two weeks. If they do this consistently, they do not need to quarantine. This has kept dozens of students in school and allowed them to have better access to their education. We will keep this going as we transition to the new quarter and the new sports seasons in early November. Hopefully, the community numbers will continue to fall and our students and families can be safe. Kudos to all the staff members who have worked very hard to manage this situation as we get through this together!

We have important work to do in 2nd term at PHS. We have a lot of curricula to master, skills to gain, memories to make, and friendships to nurture. Thank you to the community for your support as we make our way through this extraordinary time! Go Panthers!

CENTRAL WISCONSIN MATH LEAGUE

This competition started in the early 70's. As a school, PHS has participated in most of the leagues except from 2010-2014.

Last year every test was taken at PHS, but in a typical year, we would take the tests at UWSP. Usually about 50 schools participate in the challenging math competition held on campus. There are two huge rooms for the students taking the hour-long test. The schools are split into 4 groups based on school size. Pittsville is in school size 3 with about 10 other schools.

The three meets for this year will be in November, February and March. As a school we take 4 students in each category. The three categories are Algebra, Geometry, and Advanced Math.

The test challenges the upper level students with problem solving skills and precision. The average scores on these tests are usually 30-40% correct for all schools. Students can place individually or we can place as a school. Last year our highest place was Trace Wilke who finished in second place. ~ *Mrs. Downs*

UWSP MATH COMPETITION

UWSP holds a series of three math contests every year. This year the first contest will be virtual and the last two are not decided yet. The dates for the math competitions are: Nov 4, Feb 9, and Mar 30. The competition has 3 categories: Geometry, Algebra, and Advanced. There are four school size divisions and Pittsville is in school size three. In normal school years, about 50 different high schools participate with about ten schools in school size 3. Each school chooses four students in each category to represent their school for a total of 12 students. The scores are added up from all three meets to determine place winners at the end of the school year. Pittsville has most of their participants from last year back to compete again so experience will be an advantage for PHS. ~ Mrs. Grossman

SUPPLY SHORTAGES AND MILK CHANGES FROM USDA

Dear Families of Pittsville School District.

A few of our students may have noticed the change in our chocolate milk cartons during meal times. The USDA has brought into regulations for all school food service departments that have to be in place by December 3 of this year, that all flavored milk need to be fat free. In the past, we served 1% True Moo Chocolate Milk from our Deans Milk Vendor. Going forward, Dean's has changed over to meet this USDA requirement to a Non-Fat Chocolate Milk.

Also with regards to nationwide supply shortages, our food service department along with all school food service departments, have been hit especially hard. We have stayed on top of this issue from the very beginning and have kept up to make sure our students are delivered the nutritious meals each day. We have only had to make a change to the menus one day so far this year, and I am personally working each day with our vendors to make sure we continue to deliver meals our students are looking forward to for our students each day.

USDA WAIVER EXTENDED FOR THIS SCHOOL YEAR

With COVID-19 still affecting so many families, the USDA has extended the program in which all students will receive a free reimbursable breakfast and reimbursable lunch during the school year of 2021-2022. As in the case of this past school year, each student who wishes to participate can do so with no cost to their families. Milk still can be purchased for ala carte/cold lunch meals at \$.30 per milk. Any milk purchased ala carte that is not included with the reimbursable meal, such as a student wanting a milk for their cold lunch from home, will have their account charged for the milk and will need to be paid by the students' family account. With 100% in-person learning, there will be no to-go meals provided as in this past school year.



HOLIDAY SEASON APPROACHING

With the holiday seasons approaching, we would like to remind all the students of the foods that go along with them. On the last day of school before Halloween, we will be serving caramel apples with our hot lunch program. 
INTERVENTION CORNER

We thought we'd start this year by giving you information on how small intervention groups work. We started the year off with a bang and got our small intervention groups going the third week of school. Each grade level has a WIN (What I Need) time where all students are in some type of intervention - whether it is remedial or enrichment. This is when the interventionists work with small groups of students. We selected students for our first round of groups by using last spring's Aimsweb or PALs test scores, depending on the grade level. We also asked for teacher input. We provide interventions for these students based upon their needs. We progress monitor weekly or biweekly to see if what we are doing is the right intervention or if we need to switch it up. We meet as grade level teams every six weeks to discuss the intervention groups and look at the progress monitoring data that has been collected. Some students leave the small intervention groups for another intervention group in their classroom or at their grade level and some remain in the small group. ~ Ms. Schooley

JUNIOR HIGH MATH

This year, the junior high math department has undergone many changes to benefit student learning. One of these changes include longer classes which allow students to practice and apply the math they are learning. Eighth grade students have been practicing transformations of objects, seventh grade students have been practicing scale factors, and sixth graders have been learning about surface area and volume. IMPORTANT REMINDERS FOR UPPER CLASSMEN

SENIORS:

- Applications to Colleges and Tech Schools should be completed soon; Halloween = Ahead of the Game, Thanksgiving = On Time, and Christmas = Slightly Behind. Remember, the earlier you are accepted, the sooner you can apply for scholarships as well as indicate housing requests from your university/college.
- Please remember to inform Mrs. Krystowiak after you have applied and have been accepted to any college or university.
- Please remember to continually check the scholarship webpage for updated scholarships -- HS Home Page, School Counseling Tab, Scholarship Tab, 2021-2022 Scholarships and Contests Tab.
- Transcripts can be requested via the HS Home Page, Transcripts-How to obtain. Parchment is our new provider for online transcripts.
 There is a \$6 fee for official transcripts. Students can request one unofficial transcript for free, but then will be charged for them afterward. Please allow at least one full day for processing.
- Cap and Gown orders from Josten's needed to be placed by October 15th.
- The 2021-2022 FAFSA application is open. Seniors are encouraged to apply sooner than later. The FAFSA is an excellent way to help receive loans and grants for higher education.

Save the date for the annual Music Department Mattress Fundraiser, which will be held on Saturday, April 30 in the varsity gym. Look for more information coming later this school year.


THE VALUE OF AGRICULTURAL EDUCATION ~ Mrs. Meissner

IST QUARTER NEWS FROM MS. RAYGO

Our 4K-4th grade students have been learning about self-regulation!

Self-regulation is the ability to manage your emotions and behavior in accordance with the demands of the situation. It includes being able to resist highly emotional reactions to upsetting stimuli, to calm yourself down when you get upset, to adjust to a change in expectations, and to handle frustration without an outburst. It is a set of skills that enables children, as they mature, to direct their own behavior towards a goal, despite the unpredictability of the world and our own feelings.

4K: We have been learning about managing waiting, staying in our personal space, asking for what you want or need, sharing, and taking turns

Kindergarten: We have been introduced to the Zones of Regulation. Zones is an approach used to teach self-regulation by categorizing all the different ways we feel and states of alertness we experience into four concrete colored zones. The Zones framework provides strategies to teach students to become more aware of and independent in controlling their emotions and impulses, manage their sensory needs, and improve their ability to problem solve conflicts.

1st Grade: We reviewed the Zones of Regulation and learned about expected and unexpected behaviors. Expected behavior is simply behavior that is normal, reasonable, and anticipated. Unexpected behavior is behavior that is out of the norm and is unusual. This way of talking about behavior is different from how it is normally discussed in that it doesn't address behavior as simply "positive" or "negative," since what is expected can vary from situation to situation. For example, it is expected to speak quietly at a library, but not at a football game. It is expected to raise your hand to speak at school, but it would be unexpected to do that at home.

2nd Grade: We learned to look at the size of our problem and the size of our reaction to see if they match. Not all problems are the same size. Some are big and those problems can have a big reaction; but if a problem is small, the reaction should match.

3rd Grade: We reviewed the Zones of Regulation and learned what triggers us to move from the Green Zone into the Red, Blue, and Yellow Zones. Knowing our triggers will help us come up with a plan for how to handle them when they happen.

4th Grade: We learned about different parts of our brain and how they are responsible for our emotions. We talked about flipping our lids, which means that our Prefrontal Cortex is no longer in charge and the amygdala is making the decisions. This is great if we are in danger but not very helpful when we are angry at a friend.

5th Grade: We have some lessons coming up to learn about self-regulation! During the first quarter we focused on goal setting and using executive functioning skills.
