



From the Desk of District Administrator Terry Reynolds

At several points in every school year, it is good to reflect upon all the many positive educational activities happening here in the Pittsville School District. Our newsletters attempt to provide everyone a brief glimpse of many of the exciting student activities taking place. The Pittsville teaching staff attempts to provide all students with outstanding learning activities each and every day, however from time to time there are a few activities that seem to stand out from the others.

One such activity which I am very excited about is occurring in the Technology Education Department at the High School this Spring. Stephen Hadfield, Pittsville's Technology Education instructor, is in the process of teaching his students to build a Timber Frame constructed educational shelter which will be set up in our School Forest next Fall. Mr. Hadfield and his students will be building the timber frame here at school, using timbers logged from our School Forest site. This hands on/authentic learning activity is an opportunity for our Pittsville students to use the skills learned in all their classes to create a structure which will last a lifetime. The project is being primarily funded through a grant which the School Forest Committee wrote last year. Mr. Hadfield will be providing additional information in the coming months through this newsletter and the Pittsville Record, and I encourage all residents to learn more about this valuable classroom project.

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In the second quarter newsletter, I discussed the 2012-13 School Budget outlook and an anticipated \$200,000 deficit. The School Board and administration has continued to work diligently towards balancing the budget and ensuring that top quality programming continues to be the norm here in Pittsville. The District is still waiting on key pieces of information in order to determine what alternatives to take in lowering District expenditures. One major unknown area is the cost of Health Insurance for employees. The District is currently waiting to hear from Security Health Plan (the District's current health insurance provider) on what the District's renewable rates will be for the 2012-13. In the meantime, the School Board is also investigating other health insurance provider pricing as well. Once these rates are determined, the School Board will be able to move forward with additional planning and decisions in regards to balancing the budget.

At this time, no teaching staff cuts are being considered. In February, the Legislature passed a new law which allows for additional time for teacher contract renewal decisions. The District no longer needs to provide final non-renewal notification by March 15, as this date has been pushed back to May 15. This additional time provides the District two extra months to determine more precisely what the staffing and funding needs are for 2012-13 and also eliminate some of the unnecessary stress upon its employees. The preliminary budget for 2012-13 will be approved by the School Board in June.

SCHOOL CANCELLATIONS, DELAYS, EARLY DISMISSAL



PITTSVILLE HIGH SCHOOL NEWS



We have a great opportunity being offered to our students through the SCING Distance Learning Network. For \$20.78, our students can participate in a three session course designed to help prepare them for the ACT. The three sessions are April 10, 11, and 12 from 6:00 PM to 8:00 PM. The timing of this course coincides with the April 14 ACT test date. The sign up deadline is March 22. Mrs. Backaus has placed a note in the Pittsville Record. Mr. Olig has asked the various core subject teachers to speak to the juniors and seniors about the ACT preparation course. The course is open to sophomores, but the juniors and seniors who are planning to take the ACT prior to the 2012-2013 school year are especially encouraged to participate in this ACT preparation course.

The next topic is the block schedule. We have set an informational meeting about the block schedule for March 21 at 6:00. By that meeting, Mrs. Backaus and I expect to have a schedule completed which will allow block scheduling to be implemented at Pittsville High School. We are literally working to ensure that the block schedule will effectively allow our students to be in their selected classes. Everyone needs to realize that no schedule is perfect. There will be conflicts in the block schedule just like there is in an 8 period schedule. The advantage of block schedule is that students will have the opportunity to take more classes because each student will be taking 8 classes each semester instead of seven classes. Eight students and five staff members visited Elk Mound High School on February 17, and on March 1, four staff members visited Amherst High School. On both occasions, the staff and students noticed a less stressful school environment a result of students needing to focus on only four classes and three classes for teachers. Since students only focus on four classes, they are generally more successful. These are common strengths of the block schedule. This is aligned with Response to Invention (RTI) because being enrolled in fewer classes the students are able to focus on those classes. When the students returned from their visit to from Elk Mound, their comments were extremely supportive of the block schedule. The Elk Mound experience left a very favorable impression on our students. One student stated after visiting Elk Mound that the benefits of the block schedule outweighed the disadvantages.

After the Elk Mound visit, an article pertaining to the block schedule was placed on the high school webpage. A paper copy of the article was available for parents who attended the parent teacher conferences on February 22. A copy was placed in the folders of the parents who attended the 8th grade and/or sophomore meetings. The article has been sent to the Pittsville Record. The article outlines the benefits of block scheduling and invites parents to the informational meeting pertaining to the block schedule on March 21 at 6:00 PM.

In the process of building the block schedule, Mrs. Backaus and I found a number of benefits which were not available in the 8 period day. First, a traditional year long course is completed in a semester with the block schedule. If a student fails a class such as English 9 or Algebra 1, that student can be scheduled to take that class during the second semester. This option was not available in the 8 period schedule. The second benefit involves the student who has a strong interest a content area, such as math. A freshman could take Algebra 1 first semester and, if numbers permit, could take Geometry as a freshman second semester. Again, this option was not available to students in the eight period schedule. Next year, we will have students taking Pre-Algebra first semester. These students could then take Algebra 1 second semester and take Geometry as a sophomore. This allows students, to for lack of a better term, "to catch up". Previously, for a student who begins with the Pre-Algebra, it was almost impossible to take Pre-Calculus, Calculus, or College Math as a senior. The block schedule will allow a student who begins in Pre-Algebra to have access to these higher level courses.

It is hard to believe that the winter sports season is nearing completion. The girls' basketball team began regional play on Tuesday, March 6, at Onalaska Luther. Track season began on Monday, March 12. Softball and baseball can begin practicing on March 19. If weather permits, the first softball and baseball games are set for Thursday, March 29, at Neillsville. The third quarter ends on Friday, March 23. The grade check for athletic eligibility will occur for spring sports on Monday, March 26.

FBLA Regionals were held on February 5th at Stevens Point. A total of 42 PHS students competed in events with 8 students placing high enough to qualify for the State Leadership Conference to be held in La Crosse on April 2-3. Students who have qualified for state are: Nathan Amundson (3rd) Impromptu Speaking, Abi DeWilde (1st) Client Service, Nikki Dietz (4th) Sports Management, Thomas Hughes (2nd) Healthcare Administration, Breanna Kumm (3rd) Intro to Business, Stephanie Schuster (1st) Business Law, Sam Solatycki (1st) Hospitality Management, and Rachael Totzke (2nd) Intro to Business Communication. If these competitors place in the top two at State, they will then earn the right to represent Wisconsin at the National Leadership Conference in San Antonio, Texas.

Junior, Sam Solatycki, not only entered the Regional Leadership Conference as a competitor but also as a candidate for Regional Vice President. Sam was elected to this office by students from the 23 different schools in attendance. Sam will be sworn into his office at the State Leadership Conference and will begin serving his term as a state officer.

Skyping? Spanish?

With the help of Terry Reynolds the Spanish classes in Pittsville, we have the opportunity to skype with English classes in Argentina taught at a private school by Marisel Gallardo. Advanced Chemistry Class Produces Biodiesel

During the third quarter in advanced chemistry students are required to choose and design an individual laboratory research project. For her project Hannah Marti chose to produce biodiesel from various forms of oil, including canola, olive, and vegetable oil. After producing the biodiesel she compared moisture content, soap content, and purity of the fuels. At this point in her project she decided to expand its scope to determine the viability of extracting oil from soybeans grown on her family's farm and producing biodiesel from the extracted soybean oil.

Classmates Jennifer Quinnell, Steph Schuster, Nikki Dietz, and Tory Palmer, who had finished their own projects, willingly assisted Hannah in the preparation of the soybeans and extraction of the oil. The project was a great opportunity for the students to apply practical problemsolving and engineering skills.

JUNIOR HIGH FORENSICS FINISHES SEASON

The Junior High Forensics season has come to an end. This year over 60 of the 87 junior high students started the year by preparing forensics pieces. By the time of the first competition, 53 students traveled to Arcadia to compete. For Level 1 forensics, students give their speeches three times to three different judges during the course of the evening. Students must earn two "A"s to advance to Level 2. Forty-nine of the 53 earned the right to compete at DeLong Middle School in Eau Claire on February 23. The Pittsville Junior High Forensics team was just a small portion of the 900 students at this state-level competition. At DeLong, 40 of the 49 students earned blue ribbons, the highest award for junior high forensics in the state. Congratulations to all speakers. To wrap up the forensics season, students will travel to Madison on May 3 to watch the touring Broadway-production of *The Adams Family*.

3rd Grade Investigates Weather and Space





The 3rd graders had the opportunity to learn about weather and space from some experts. Meteorologist Justin Loew and Mr. Science (Bob Wolff), presented a wealth of weather information to our students using technology and an assortment of weather experiments. These presentations helped the children better understand the function of the weather tools that are used and how the different atmospheric factors affect our weather.

Our students also traveled to the UW-Stevens Point Planetarium to visually explore the night sky, constellations, and the solar system. Prior to our trip to the planetarium, the students investigated the different planets that make up our solar system. Each student developed a technology based presentation to share information about a specific planet.

These were the culminating activities for our Weather and Space Units. All presentations engaged, enlightened, and entertained our students!

Accounts below \$25.00 will be notified weekly using email and the Pittsville School District Instant Alert System. The notice explains that your family food service funds are running low and money should be added as soon as possible.

If a family account gets below zero, a notice will be sent out stating if the amount due is not paid in three working days, your children will no longer be able to participate in the breakfast and/or lunch program. If no money is received, a note will go home explaining the account is closed and Pittsville Schools will no longer be providing breakfast, lunch, or milk. It is then the parent's responsibility to provide their child with a lunch from home. Once money is added, your children may again participate in the school's food service programs.



Pittsville Outdoor Classroom Begins

Work has begun on Pittsville's outdoor classroom. In the Fall, Pittsville's School Forest Committee met and decided on a building design. After analyzing several designs, the committee decided to move forward with a timber framed outdoor structure. Timber framing, an age-old elegant building system consisting of large wood posts and beams with interlocking joinery, allows the school to use red and white oak timbers directly cut from the school's 140-acre forest. The trees were felled this winter by Wilke Landscaping and are currently being milled by Kuehn Sawmill & Forest Products.



While the logging and milling process is underway, the Pittsville Building and Construction class has been working diligently to prepare for the arrival of the timbers. The class has built a 1/8 inch scale model of the building to assist in the actual layout and construction of the timber frame.



Timbers will be arriving soon and the class will begin cutting actual joinery. The building is scheduled to be raised early next Fall. Students and Community Help Save Lives

The Pittsville High School Student Council helped sponsor a spring blood drive. The BloodCenter of Wisconsin arrived on the morning of February 17 and accepted donations throughout the school day.

Overall results of the day were good as 46 people registered to donate whole blood and 40 units were collected. There were also 2 people who donated platelets and 2 who donated double red cells at this drive.

Math Students Make Contribution to FREERICE - Join with Us

Many of the high school math classes have been introduced to Freerice.com. This website offers a variety of different multiple choice questions including vocabulary, Spanish, famous art, chemistry, math and other foreign language. We are working with the pre-algebra. Students have been challenged to answer one thousand questions correctly by the end of the third quarter. Many students exceeded that goal within the first four weeks and become competitive in being at the top of their class. The cool part is, for every question they answer correctly, the advertisers supply ten grains of dry rice to a starving country. While gaining efficiency in their math skills, students are also helping to care for starving people.

At mid-term, we did a bit of an investigation about what our rice would look like and cost. Students took small samples of rice, counted and massed them, created a graph which they could then use to write an equation for and determine their mass, their class's mass, and the schools mass. From this information, they then used the consumer information on the rice bag to determine the amount of fresh water needed to make their rice and the cost to advertisers for of our 3rd quarter goal school wide.

Unfortunately, it takes a lot more than 1,300,000 grains of rice to make a LOT of rice. Students would like to encourage our community, parents and fellow students to join in this challenge and see what we can all do for a good cause. Please join in the fun, education and donation.

Elementary school students will also go home with Harvest of the Month newsletters with fun facts, recipes and more about the monthly farm fresh products.

In addition, Pittsville agriculture classes will soon begin planting lettuce and other greens in their greenhouses. Those greens will eventually find their way into the school cafeterias so that student's can enjoy their local harvest beginning near the end of March or early April. - 1. **Local Scholarship Due Dates**: Please remember to check the due dates for scholarships on the Scholarship Website; most local scholarships are due Friday, April 13th, but some are due sooner.
