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#### From the Desk of District Administrator Terry Reynolds

During the past two months, there has been much media attention being paid to all the controversy happening in Madison concerning Governor Walker's Budget Repair Bill and Budget Bill. During this stressful and challenging time for public school employees, I am very

proud to say that the children attending the Pittsville School District have continued to receive excellent instruction and lesson activities from their teachers and support personnel each and every day.

This has been an extremely difficult time for our staff, not knowing and then seeing their collective bargaining rights being eliminated, nine teachers receiving preliminary non-renewal/lay-off letters, and none of the employees really knowing how all this turmoil will totally impact their livelihood/careers in the future. Through this entire political and budgetary crisis, the teachers and support staff have displayed only but the utmost professionalism at school. It is when an organization/group experiences the most difficult times, that you see the true makeup of the organization. The Pittsville School District can be very proud of its school system and employees. They are outstanding, dedicated employees, and they have proved that students do come first in their work here!

So you may be asking, what is in store for the Pittsville School District next year? The School Board met at a Special Meeting on March 10 and approved four teacher retirements (which it is anticipated will not be replaced) and approved to provide 2.5 final teacher non-renewal notices to other staff. If all of these positions are eliminated, the total teacher reductions Pittsville has encountered since 2002 will be **14.5**. As you can see, the District has reduced staff over the years with its declining enrollment, and budgetary issues. The School Board has made the necessary and difficult decisions. Due to the revenue limits, the budget next year will need to be reduced by approximately \$1,000,000 from last year's total (had we not passed the recurring referendum three years ago, that amount would have been \$1,525,000). The preliminary estimates that the mill rate will be lowered \$1.00 per \$1,000 valuation.

Our students unfortunately through these reductions in staffing are now or will be experiencing larger individual classes, less time in special courses such as Music, Guidance, and Physical Education, etc. I predict that any further reductions in budget revenues in the future will need to result in programming cuts for students.

Let's continue to be very proud of Pittsville schools, the education that our children receive here and remain supportive of staff, and budgetary needs through these difficult times.

# PITTSVILLE HIGH SCHOOL NEWS

This is the time of year where our seniors are looking to move on to their post-secondary plans. Graduation is in two months. During the course of the school year, I have written about how students have taken Advanced Placement Classes and how, by scoring at a certain level on the Advanced Placement Test, these students have earned credit towards a four-year college course.

Students can also earn credits in the technical college field while in high school. Pittsville High School has an articulation agreement with Mid-State Technical College. We have courses "articulated" in the technical college curriculum that are taught at Pittsville High School. Once the curriculums are aligned, the high school student takes the course, such as "Horticulture." If the student earns the approved grade, a B or higher, the student will earn high school credit and can receive a certificate from the high school instructor. This certificate is then given to the technical college resulting in technical college credit being given for the class taken at Pittsville High School.

Currently, Pittsville High School has an articulation agreement in Child Care and Health Career Connections. Students with a grade of a B or higher are eligible for transcripted credit. Students receiving a B- or lower are not eligible. Transcripted credit means that the grade the student receives in the class at the high school level is transcripted as the same grade on the Mid-State Technical College transcript. This option is available to our students because we are teaching a curriculum equivalent to a Mid-State class.

We have an agreement in place with Mid-State for advanced standing in Flowers, Plants and Horticulture. In this case, a student earning a B or better receives credit for completing the class, but no grade is recorded on the Mid-State transcript.

We are investigating other classes to increase the number of articulation agreements. This past year we began teaching a math class called Technical Math. We use the identical text book as Mid-State. After teaching the class for a year, we are hoping that the students who take the Technical Math Class next year will be able to use the articulation to earn Tech Math credit from Mid-State. Because the Tech Math class is a general education requirement, besides earning a grade of a B or higher, the students also need to test at a certain level on the Accuplacer Test before credit is given at the Technical College Level. Again, this class will be given advanced standing. Credit is awarded, but the grade is not recorded.

In this article, I have explained three different manners in which articulation agreements work. The manner in which a course is articulated is determined by Mid-State Technical College.

Mark Denniston, the chemistry instructor, attended a meeting at Mid-State Technical College the first week of March. He is investigating the possibility of working towards an articulation agreement in chemistry.

The articulation agreements between the Pittsville High School and Mid-State Technical College are a great way for a high school credit to "double up", saving time and money after high school. Our staff has worked to develop an alignment with Mid-State on other curriculum to assist our students. The other Wisconsin Technical Colleges may accept our articulation agreements with Mid-State Technical College.

On Monday, March 14<sup>th</sup>, 10 PHS students were inducted into the Pittsville High School National Honor Society Chapter; all new inductees and their families were in attendance. Popular Literature is a class developed to encourage reading. The class is set up to be an independent class where students can read the books that they want to read. To earn an "A", students must read a minimum of ten books with six books from the following: Classic Literature, British Literature, World Literature, Female Author, Science Fiction, Fantasy, Mystery, Nonfiction, Poetry Collection, Short Story Collection, Outdoor/Nature Writing, and Award Winner (Nobel, Pulitzer, etc.).

Students write an MLA style bibliography and a plot annotation for each book read. Each student receives points for reading each day and doing a monthly book report or book talk. Students learned how to use the Pittsville School District Library Search Engine-Destiny. The March book report will utilize an online poster maker-Glogster. Glogster is a creative way to combine photos and images, text, video and music in an interactive poster that can be shared with registered users.

We have all enjoyed the hidden benefits of reading. According to the article "Reading for Pleasure: A Research Overview" published by The National Literary Trust, book choice is important to motivate students to be life-long readers. When an individual is reading about a subject they enjoy they are more likely to enjoy reading. Obvious benefits of increased reading are improved reading comprehension and the increase in students' personal vocabulary. The research also identifies other benefits such as improved writing skills, grammar, self-confidence, and higher IQ scores.

Students in Pop Lit have already read over 45 books since January 18<sup>th</sup>. While not every student in Pop Lit is an avid reader, the benefits of setting time aside each day to read for pleasure is definitely worthwhile. Several students have read multiple books with over 500 pages. A sampling of the literature read: Gone with the Wind (1024 pages) A Boy Called It, Firefly Lane, In Ecstasy, Until I Find You (824 pages), Field Guide to Farm-All Tractors, Harry Potter, The Great Gatsby, True Grit, and A Long Way Gone: Memoirs of a Boy Soldier. 5

#### PITTSVILLE AGRICULTURE DEPARTMENT APPLYING FOR SCIENCE CREDIT FOR HORTICULTURE SCIENCE CLASS

The past four years, the Pittsville Agriculture Department and Mr. Bill Urban have been working the Department of Public Instruction to meet criteria that gives students the opportunity to engage in rigorous, authentic learning experiences that are relevant to their learning needs and future ambitions. The Horticulture Science curriculum is now being submitted to the DPI for state review. Upon approval, the Horticulture Science Class will be an accepted science credit throughout the University of Wisconsin System as an elective. Review and approval of this document takes approximately 60-90 days. If approved, it gives the student another opportunity to explore an agriculture venue that they may not have looked into. The "crosswalk" document aligns the science state academic standards with the objectives and activities that are taught in the Agriculture and Natural Resource Horticulture Science course. There are approximately 30 schools with in the state that the agriculture/science crosswalk has taken place with many positive results.

#### 2011 PITTSIVLLE FFA BANQUET A SUCCESS!!

The Pittsville FFA held it annual banquet on Monday, March 21. It was a great success, with over on one hundred-thirty people in attendance. #### Math Common Core Standards Are Here

The Common Core State Standards (CCSS) in mathematics require a more focused approach which defines specific objectives and then requires students to understand these concepts to a deeper level which will enable them to better use their knowledge within 'real life' applications.

One of the eight mathematics standards to be addressed is Modeling with Mathematics. Mathematically proficient students are able to apply the mathematics to solve problems from everyday life, society and in work places. By high school, proficient students apply what they know and are comfortable making assumptions and approximations to simplify a complicated situation, also realizing that these generalizations may need to be adjusted later in their test for accuracy.

The Honors Algebra 2 class recently completed their study of quadratic equations with a project that involved modeling. Students were given data relating temperature, wind speed, and wind chill temperatures. Each student chose a method, favorable to them, to generate a graph of the data and then curve fit the data into six quadratic equations. They then reached beyond to generalize the six equations into one general equation. Students were then able to verify their work during the sub zero temperatures and wind speeds of Wisconsin's early February temperatures. Evaluating their results in the context of this application and reflection on whether the results made sense compared to wind chill tables allowed students to rework their conclusion and equation.

This project was a new experience for the students who were challenged to understand the various terms within their quadratic equations, identify patterns and pick reasonable means to generalize these patterns. All the challenges took students beyond evaluating quadratic equations and other basic skills taught within the current standards and gave them exposure to using their mathematics beyond text book generated problems.

On Thursday, February 17<sup>th</sup>, James L. Weber, PhD., President of Prevention Genetics of Marshfield conducted a presentation to Mr. Steward's  $10^{\mbox{th}}$  grade Biology students in the auditorium. The presentation lasted over 40 minutes and brought to light the scientific value of genetic research in present day medicine. Dr. Webber discussed topic related to genetics the advances being made in medicine and treatment possibilities, current research into genetic diseases and their affects on the human body, limitation to human genetic cures, new research advancements and in genetic implementation into areas of cancer and other genetic disorders, the evolution of genetics and the human race, and social ethics of genetic research.

The with DNA presentation started (deoxyribonucleic acid) structure, how DNA replicates, DNA and protein synthesis, and the history behind DNA studies. This was followed by a discussion on the Human Genome Project and its impact on the genetic disorders that inflict humans worldwide. After the presentation, a question and answer session concluded the presentation. Dr. Weber relayed that the students asked thought provoking questions and that he enjoyed speaking to our Pittsville High School students.

#### SCIENCE OLYMPIAD TEAM COMPETES AT REGIONALS


