### From the Desk of District Administrator Terry Reynolds



It is well understood that education is the key to America's economic growth and prosperity and to our ability to compete in the global economy. It is the path to good jobs, and higher earning power for all Americans. It is necessary for our democracy to work. It fosters the cross-border, cross-cultural collaboration required to solve the most challenging problems of our time.

Technology is now at the core of virtually every aspect of our daily lives and work, and educators must leverage it to provide engaging and powerful learning experiences and content in more complete, authentic, and meaningful ways for their students. Technology -based learning, and assessment systems will be pivotal in improving student learning and generating data that can be used to continuously improve the educational system at all levels. # FAIR FUNDING PLAN WOULD DECREASE PITTSVILLE SCHOOL TAX LEVY

The Pittsville School District would see an increase in state equalization aid, Pittsville taxpayers a reduction in their school tax levy, if the Governor and State Legislature adopt State Superintendent Tony Evers' school finance reform proposal in the upcoming 2011-13 budget cycle. The "Fair Funding for Our Future" plan was introduced by Evers on November 15<sup>th</sup>.

Pittsville 's potential increased state equalization aid, which is based on the level of funding available to Wisconsin K-12 public schools if the Fair Funding plan was in place for the 2010-11 school year, would have increased from the \$3,891,633 certified by the DPI on October 15<sup>th</sup> to \$4,671,403 under the plan. This change would not directly increase school spending, but it would have reduced the impact felt by Pittsville\_School District taxpayers since revenue caps would still be in effect.

Had the Fair Funding plan been in place this year, the district's 2010-2011 certified tax levy of \$3,563,181 would have been reduced by \$779,770 to \$3,111,863 under the proposal. Even when we take into account that Pittsville's current school levy tax credits would be folded into general school aids, Pittsville taxpayers would still have seen an overall tax reduction of \$451,082. Simply put, the Fair Funding plan creates a more transparent and honest school tax system for local taxpayers by redirecting the school levy tax credit into general school aids.

The plan, as proposed, would not take effect until the 2012-2013 fiscal year, but would bring relief to a district that has seen the property tax levy increase by 28% the past two years despite only 7% in increased spending during that same two year time period.

### PITTSYILLE HIGH SCHOOL NEWS

The big event at the high school will be the National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) for selected seniors on Wednesday, February 2. Often in the news reports, American students are compared to their counterparts in say, Germany, China, and Japan. The results from the NAEP tests are often used in obtaining these results. The NAEP testing is also used in news reports to report the current trends in education. For instance, when you hear that the 12<sup>th</sup> graders made gains in reading, these results were often generated through NAEP testing.

Earlier this year we had to send the people at NAEP a list of all the seniors. From that list, NAEP randomly selected 30 students to participate in the upcoming assessment. When I met with the NAEP representatives on January 12, some of our foreign exchange students and those graduating early were on the list to be tested. These students will be excluded from the test. This left 24 seniors to be tested in two groups on the  $2^{nd}$  of February.

Some of you may be aware that the State of Wisconsin is developing new tests to replace the current Wisconsin Knowledge and Concepts Examination, which are given to students in  $4^{th}$  through  $8^{th}$  grade and  $10^{th}$  grade. Because the state wants to have the results from the tests returned to school in a more efficient fashion, the new tests could be computer-based. The NAEP tests on February  $2^{nd}$  will be the first time that our students will take a computer based assessment in writing. I was told we are one of the few schools which were chosen for the computer based writing assessment. It will be interesting to see the process. The area which a school is tested on differs from school-to-school.

The students chosen to test will be given two writing prompts during the testing period. Each prompt will have a 30 minute maximum period for testing. There are three types of writing prompts to persuade, explain, or convey an experience. Twelfth grade students are most likely to be given writing prompts to explain or to persuade.

The only item the students need to bring to the testing room is themselves. Students will not be allowed to bring a book to read. Usually we encourage students to bring books with them so the student has something to do between tests. This time the protocol is different. Also, no cell phones are allowed during the testing.

For the students, this is an opportunity to be involved in a writing test. I have given Mr. Simonds samples of writing prompts so all the seniors can be exposed to the process. This will help the seniors chosen to be tested to have some insight into the expectations of the test. The seniors who are tested will be awarded  $1\frac{1}{2}$  hours of community service. These types of tests are essential for our government to monitor our country's educational progress.

During my conversation with the proctors of the test, they also stressed the new emphasis on writing. The ACT, which is the examination used by most colleges in the State of Wisconsin for college acceptance, currently has an optional writing component. For a student to be accepted into the University of Wisconsin-Madison, students are required to take the writing component of the ACT.

### Agriculture Education and Pittsville FFA News and Notes

The Pittsville Agriculture Education and FFA have once again had a busy few months. Just a reminder to people who bought labor from the FFA this past October to please contact those members to complete their work hours. It is always easier to complete the hour during the school year. February 2, the Pittsville FFA will be competing in Rosholt at the District Speaking Contest from 3:30-7:00 PM. Students from ten area schools will be competing to go onto the Sectional Contest held in March. The speaking contests include Quiz Bowl, Extemporaneous Speaking, Prepared, Creed, Interview, Parliamentary Procedure and Discussion Meet.

The Agriculture Education Department has been taking students and exploring the agriculture of Pittsville. FFA member and current student Alesha Osgood came in and spoke about her dairy goat operation she runs at her family's farm on Polish Road. Alesha spoke to our Large Animal Science Class about how she started in her dairy goat enterprise four years ago. At the height of her operation, she has had over 100 dairy goats on her farm and currently has 24 goats plus a few kids. She buys and sells dairy goats but does not have time to milk them. One interesting fact was that dairy goats are the number one milk producing animal in the world -- it doesn't produce the most milk, but it is most milked animal in the world. Alesha is also applying for the State FFA Degree and a State Proficiency in Specialty Animal Production.

Nancy and Ray Stauner spoke to our class about their Elk Farm south of Pittsville. This is the fifth year we have visited. The class learned the trials and tribulations of raising elk. Some interesting points were Nancy is an artist and Ray is a taxidermist, the elk are really hard on the fence with their antlers, and antlers fall off while horns do not. This year they will remove the antlers to protect their animals from getting hurt. Elk meat is a very healthy meat with low cholesterol. The elk go into rut from October through mid-November, during that time Ray and Nancy will not go into the pen because the aggressiveness of the bull. The class also toured and was educated by Troy Robus (C & R Ranch), Jeannie and Tim Eekhoff (M & M Hog Farm) and Matt Lippert (Grass Ridge Farm).

The eighth grade students are completing their tractor safety unit. This semesters' tractor safety certified students include: Calvin Amundson, Jaimee Arnold, Paul Baum, Kari Beckman, Breeanne Behselich, Tom Braun, Savanna Buchli, William Darr, Erika Peterson, Adriana Zichert, Kate Delaney, Taner Fox, Austin Hoernke, Kayla Ignatowski, Alex Jensen, Anna Johnson, Dayton Kissner, Mckenzie Knudson, and Haley Kumm. The tractor safety course instructs students on how to be safe around farm equipment and the importance of a safe attitude, as well as giving students a basic understanding of tractor operation. Also thank you to Josh Calaway for taking the donated tractor back to Power Pac.

Nutritional information about apples and the importance of using locally grown produce.



### **Apple Crisp**

### Ingredients

6 cups apples (2 lbs.)

1 tablespoon lemon juice

1/2 cup brown sugar

1/2 cup honey

1/4 teaspoon salt

1/3 cup flour

1/3 cup butter

#### **Directions**

Peel and slice apples. Arrange in a greased baking dish. Sprinkle with lemon juice. Spread honey over top.

Mix flour, rolled oats, brown sugar and salt together. Cut in butter until mixture looks like coarse bread crumbs. Sprinkle evenly over top of apples.

Bake at 375 degrees F. for 45 to 50 minutes, until the apples are cooked and the crust is nice and brown. Serve warm.

### Kids Design Games To Teach Fire Safety

ire prevention programs for children have been done with about the same flair for years.

We teach "Stop Drop and Roll," "don't play with matches," "feel the door," "stay low in smoke." All are very important components.

Having done these programs for more than 30 years, coming up with new ideas with minimal costs has been difficult.


If there is a most rewarding area of the fire service, it has to be working with children. They have minds that absorb information like a sponge, and we usually get immediate feedback. What's more rewarding than that?


During the past two years, I have had the opportunity to work with elementary school teacher Jeannie Pavlik. Her 22 years of insight into education has opened another door for those of us providing fire prevention.

The Pittsville Elementary School third-grade class of 2009-10 introduced my department to a game created in its classroom called "Stop Drop and Roll the Dice for Fire Safety." It's a game created for children to make learning about fire safety fun. A series of cards is used to teach the fundamentals of fire safety. Each player has a piece to move on the board to work toward the final goal. In the process of trying to win, several fire safety messages are obtained.

This year, the class of 2010-11 is playing another game related to fire prevention education called "Situation Contained." This game was "rolled out" by students during fire prevention week this year. Collecting similar cards with fire safety messages is only a part of the game. When all of the same cards are obtained, the winner must read the safety rules that pertain to that situation and announce "Situation Contained."

# "The Handwriting is on the Wall" in Ms. Freedlund's English Classes

If you hear your student randomly interrupting a sporting event, movie, or car ride yelling "Allusion" then Ms. Freedlund is to blame. Students in her sophomore and junior classes are just completing a warm-up activity about allusions, or references, to history, culture, and literature. Students can earn up to 25 points of extra credit a quarter by finding allusions in books or magazines (1 point) or spoken (1/2 point). Over two years we cover 90 allusions from albatross around one's neck-a burden to Xanadu-a magical place. Students learn background as well as meaning. In the one-two minutes a day spent on covering allusions they learn about history as well as language.

English 10 classes began a Short Story Unit in January. Students reviewed the basic elements of a Short Story: plot, point-of-view, character, setting, theme, symbol, irony, and tone. After reading several stories, students will began writing their own short stories. Their first story will use visuals from old magazines to find pictures of possible characters and setting. Students have practiced short writings while listening to music. Students then were asked to write down an adjective that describes the 'tone' of the music. They then share their tone adjective with the class. Several students have found this to be an easier way to discuss tone. It is also a great way to enjoy different types of music.

Juniors are just finishing a review of early American Literature. Some of the literature we have perused includes: Native American creation myths; the Puritan Plain Style of Anne Bradstreet; Benjamin Franklin aphorisms; a Washington Irving folktale; Transcendental Writings of Emerson: Anti-transcendentalists Nathaniel Hawthorne ("The Minister's Black Veil") and a play based on Melville's Moby Dick; Fireside Poets and several poems written by Emily Dickinson. Students found Dickinson to be a poet they could relate to. One young lady remarked, "Her poems actually make sense!" Students also created both aphorism posters (An education is like silver in the mine) and transcendental quotation posters (Do not go where the path may lead, go instead where there is no path and leave a trail). The Transcendental posters are currently displayed for all to enjoy.

Advanced Placement Literature and Composition: In December AP kids concluded Ibsen's play *A Doll House* by writing an AP Question 3 essay. After a couple of weeks of poetry, in which students read, discussed, and completed AP practice multiple choice questions they will be writing an AP Question 1 comparing two poems. The focus on quickly reading and recognizing elements of poetry, forming a thesis, and writing an essay in 30-40 minutes is excellent practice for the AP Literature test in May. Students can earn college credit which offers them advanced standing as well as a savings in tuition.
